A RUSSIAN ADVANCE.

Heavy Firing Yesterday on Kuroki's Right.

General Kuroki's Headquarters, Aug. 9, via Pusan, Aug. 10.—Unofficial reports were current yesterday that a large force of Russians was advancing to attack the Japanese right.

RUSSIANS IN WONSAN.

Retire Before Superior Force of Japanese—An Invasion.

Seoul, Aug. 9.—Two companies of Russian troops entered Wonsan yesterday morning. Finding the Japanese to be in superior strength the Russians retired.

SKIRMISH NEAR SAMAJA.

Small Japanese Force Driven from Three Passes.

Sin-Tsin-Tin (sixty-six miles east of Moukden), Aug. 8.—A column of Russian troops, consisting of two companies of Cossacks, two companies of sharpshooters, a company of infantry and a couple of mountain guns, set out on August 4 on the Samaja road, toward Tsalan-Chan.

REGIMENT IN A TRAP.

Japanese Force Almost Wiped Out in Si-Mu-Cheng Battle.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 9.—A dispatch from Si-Mu-Ling, dated August 1 and filed at Liao-Yang on August 6, relates an incident which occurred in the pursuit of the retreating Russians between Si-Mu-Cheng and Si-Mu-Ling, on the Hai-Cheng road.

RUSSIAN NAVAL NEEDS.

Lord Selborne Speaks of Lessons from War—Strength of Powers.

London, Aug. 9.—Replying to criticism of the naval expenditure in the House of Lords to-day, Lord Selborne, First Lord of the Admiralty, warmly defended the outlay.

INEVITABLE MOVES WEST?

Rumor of Attempt to Relieve Russians at Liao-Yang.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 9.—It is reported in military circles that Lieutenant General Linevitch is marching with troops from the direction of Vladivostok to create a diversion in the rear of General Kuroki's army.

LIAO-YANG NOT YET ATTACKED.

General Sakharoff Reports No Change in the Situation.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 9.—Lieutenant General Sakharoff telegraphs that there is no change in the situation around Liao-Yang.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 9.—A private report from Vladivostok says that the Knight Commander had an abundance of coal when she was sunk. It is impossible to confirm this statement here.

EGYPT'S IMPROVEMENT.

London, Aug. 9.—A Blue Book issued by the Foreign Office this evening contains the report of Sir William Garstin, Under Secretary for Public Works in Egypt, upon the basins of the Upper Nile, and a dispatch from Lord Cromer.

AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL CHOSEN.

Dalgety Selected by the Federal Senate and House.

Melbourne, Victoria, Aug. 9.—The location of the federal capital, so long in dispute, is believed to have been finally settled by a vote to-day in the House of Representatives, approving Dalgety, in the Bombala district.
