FIGHT OVER "MONEY BAG." BOTH CLAIM THE POWER.

"I'm the Whole Thing," Say McCarran and Dowling.

Senator Victor J. Dowling—I'm the campaign boss here, in charge of spending the money in the greater New York.

The whole fight between Murphy and McCarran is over the disbursement of the money collected by August Belmont and Cord Meyer for campaign purposes.

Charles F. Murphy says that Senator Dowling comes pretty near being the whole thing. "You can make up your mind," said Mr. Murphy yesterday at Tammany Hall.

Senator McCarran had not been informed of the Murphy programme when seen yesterday afternoon at the Hoffman House.

"Well," said the Brooklyn boss, with a significant gleam in his eye, "it will be a cold day when I take orders from any one with reference to the management of the campaign in Kings County."

"And Mr. Murphy says that practically you are a shorn of power," said the interrogator.

"I guess I've got plenty of power left yet," replied Mr. McCarran.

"Tell him I'll be up in a few minutes," said Mr. Dowling.

"Senator McCarran," said the messenger, "said for me to tell you that he wants to see you right away, as it is important."

The rosy countenance of Senator Dowling grew more radiant, as he hesitated for a few seconds, and then he excused himself and went to Mr. McCarran's room.

State Chairman Meyer, William S. Rodie, Senators Dowling and McCarran were in conference for an hour yesterday afternoon, and afterward Messrs. Dowling and McCarran continued the talk.

William S. Rodie, head of the bureau of organization, said yesterday that he had appointed Congressman Francis Burton Harrison vice-chairman of the bureau.

EXPECTS TO CARRY OHIO BY 50,000. Senator Silberberg, of Cincinnati, Looks for Normal Majority in Buckeye State.

State Senator Max Silberberg, of Cincinnati, who was at the Waldorf-Astoria yesterday afternoon, referring to the situation in the Buckeye State, said: "A preliminary canvass of Ohio by the Republican leaders shows that we shall carry it by a normal Republican majority of about 50,000."

COWHERD NEEDS CASH. Coming Here Again to Get Means to Elect Democratic Congress.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Chairman Cowherd of the Democratic Congress Committee is extremely anxious to remove his headquarters to New York.

Mr. Cowherd still adheres strongly to the opinion that his committee would like to hold closer communion with the campaign funds which the Democratic managers hope to capture from reluctant contributors.

With a view to perfecting arrangements for the removal of his headquarters, Mr. Cowherd visited New-York last week, but met with a somewhat chilling reception.

Should the national committee continue to sidetrack the Congress committee, the breach already made in the Democratic ranks will be widened to such an extent as to render co-operation absolutely impossible.

NICOLL VISITS PARKER. Tells Him of New-York City Trust Plans Approved.

Esopus, N. Y., Aug. 23.—Plans for the national campaign were laid before Judge Parker to-day by De Lancey Nicoll, of New-York, vice-chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

Mr. Nicoll indicated the close of the Murphy-McCarren feud in New-York, and that the appointment of Victor J. Dowling as a member of the State executive committee and the head of a bureau of organization which will have charge of the city campaign was satisfactory to Charles F. Murphy.

Four members of a special committee of seven appointed by the Reform Club of New-York to visit Judge Parker called at Rosemont to-day and extended the candidate an invitation to speak under the club's auspices.

The charges made on Monday by labor men with the District Attorney's office were supposedly backed by J. Davis, a contractor, and the title he might be glad to avail himself of the club's invitation.

Mr. Davis is in Chicago. This firm has not authorized any campaign action in league with any labor union. Mr. Davis has not been in consultation with any lawyer or contractor.

The books of Local No. 2, of the Plumbers and Gasfitters' Union, of which Weinsheimer is president, were taken to the District Attorney's office yesterday to allow Mr. Rand to inspect them.

GRASSHOPPERS DESCEND ON HARLEM. A Badge of Loyalty to Isaac A. Hopper in His Fight to Hold the XXXII.

Several hundred grasshoppers descended on the XXXII Assembly District, in Harlem, last night, and were eagerly snatched up by friends of Tammany Leader Isaac A. Hopper.

Some enthusiastic admirer of Hopper is responsible for the introduction of the insects, his idea being that the grasshoppers should swallow Hopper now, as he thinks they will have to after the primary contest next Tuesday.

TEXAS REPUBLICAN TICKET. Fort Worth, Tex., Aug. 23.—The Republican State convention met here to-day and nominated the following ticket: Governor, J. C. Lowden, of Taylor County; Lieutenant Governor, Sam Davidson, of Tarrant; Associate Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Lock McDaniel, of Harris County.

The platform indorses the national convention, opposes State banks and demands a look at State banks. Among the features of the convention was the total elimination of negroes from the State ticket.

VOTE FOR FINN, SAYS MURPHY. The members of the Tammany Hall general committee of the 1st Assembly District met last night at No. 11 Hudson street.

Every speaker advocated the support of Parker and Davis, and Mr. Dowling brought a personal letter from Charles F. Murphy, expressing his confidence in Finn for District Judge and requesting the support of the district workers for Mr. Finn.

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MRS. MAYBRICK ARRIVES. ANSWER TO ARMSTRONG. Said to Have Acknowledged Her Reversionary Right in Estates.

Mrs. Florence Elizabeth Maybrick, who has spent the prime of her life in an English prison on a doubtfully proved charge of killing her husband with poison, arrived yesterday on the steamer Vaderland from Antwerp.

She was accompanied on her voyage to this country by Samuel B. Hayden, of the law firm of Hayden & Yarell, attorneys for Mrs. Maybrick, and by Mr. Hayden's wife.

When the customs officials boarded the Vaderland yesterday, an effort was made by them to expedite the examining of her baggage, which was done in her stateroom.

At the pier she was met by a carriage and driven to the Holland House, where she is staying. In the evening, at the Holland House, Messrs. Hayden & Yarell issued the following statement in answer to the statement made by David W. Armstrong that the British government had been tricked into releasing Mrs. Maybrick.

Armstrong's statement is absolutely false, and coming at this time, it is even more cruel than Armstrong's treatment of Mrs. Maybrick and the Baroness von Roques.

As my mothers was not able to accompany me, I came over under the protection of Mr. Hayden, of Hayden & Yarell, my attorneys, and his wife, I am assured by my English physician, Dr. W. W. Wimer, of Washington, D. C., who prescribed for me during the voyage, that rest and quiet will, in time, restore my health.

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BANKER'S SON MISSING. Hebrew Who Married Christian Says He Won't Return.

Henry Jarmulowsky, after having lost \$20,000 in speculation, it is alleged, is missing from his home at No. 153 West Seventy-ninth-st., having sent word to his bride four months that he would not return.

Mr. Jarmulowsky, who, until her marriage, was Miss Miss McCullum, is nearly distracted over the absence of her husband. He is the son of Samuel Jarmulowsky, a well known banker of No. 64 Canal-st. The young wife is a Catholic.

Jarmulowsky and Miss McCullum were married on April 29 in the Broadway Tabernacle. The couple for a time kept their marriage secret, as the bridegroom's father was a devout Hebrew, and the son feared his wrath if he should reveal his marriage to a Christian girl.

Heartbroken, the young woman took the letter to the police and asked them to help her find her husband. She says that they gave her little encouragement.
