RENEW ATTACK ON FORTS.

Japanese Rain Shells on Port Arthur.

Next Guns Used.

Chao-Foo, Sept. 17.—A Japanese who arrived here today reports that the citizens of Dalny on September 15 expected that the general attack upon Port Arthur would be renewed upon the following day.

Both Chinese and Japanese recent arrivals agree that the bombardment of Port Arthur became terrific at dawn of September 15, and continued until the forenoon of September 16.

Yan-Kia-Tun, a village at Pigeon Bay held by the Russians, has been evacuated by them secretly. The Japanese have not occupied the village.

Five hundred cavalrymen who attempted to drive the Japanese from Palung-Shan have not returned, and it is believed that the fortress there has been captured.

THE FLAG MUST STAY PUT.

Law Requiring Display Over Public Buildings Ordered Strictly Observed.

Washington, Sept. 17.—The Acting Secretary of the Treasury has issued a circular to all the principal officers under that department throughout the country, calling their special attention to an article of the customs regulations of 1899, as follows:

Article 1518. The flag of the United States shall be displayed over all public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department on February 22, May 30 and July 4, from sunrise to sunset. Should any of the last three days fall on Sunday, the flag is to be displayed on the day that is observed locally. On May 30 the flag should be placed at halfmast. The revenue flag of the United States, consisting of sixteen perpendicular stripes of alternate red and white, with a blue canton containing thirteen stars, and the arms of the United States in dark blue on white field, as the Union, shall also be hoisted over all custom buildings during the four days of business, except in stormy weather.

Acting Secretary Taylor declares that on a number of occasions the provisions of this article have been disregarded, and he warns all federal officials to observe the law strictly and see that it is carried out to the letter.

CONTRABAND RULES.

Horses and Railway Material Not Exempted by Russia.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17.—Count Lamsdorff's reply to the British Ambassador, Sir Charles Hardinge, yesterday, on the subject of Great Britain's representations in regard to contraband of war, admitted the conditional character of all articles mentioned in section 10, article 6, of the Russian regulations, except horses and other beasts of burden, which, Russia insists, remain in the category of absolute contraband.

In reply to the representations of Ambassador McCormick in behalf of the United States cotton, but, as stated yesterday, railway material, certain classes of machinery and boilers to be used on warships continue to be absolute contraband.
