

MANY ACCIDENTS ARE HURT. Bad Collision at Forty-second-st. and Ninth-ave.

In a collision between a northbound Ninth-ave. surface car and a westbound Forty-second-st. surface car, yesterday, over a dozen passengers were injured, three of them being taken to Roosevelt Hospital. Those taken to the hospital were: FLANNAGAN, Patrick, seventeen, of No. 545 West Fifty-seventh-st., right leg fractured, scalp wound and shock.

A BOMB MYSTERY. Policeman Says That One Was Thrown at a Brougham.

What the police think was a bomb or a hand grenade was exploded in Thirty-eighth-st. between Sixth-ave. and Broadway yesterday afternoon, directly behind a finely appointed brougham occupied by a fashionably dressed couple. The crash started the crowds in Broadway and in the side street.

BUILDING BURIES MANY. Number Have Remarkable Escapes—No One Killed.

Memphis, Oct. 31.—The building occupied by the Continental Savings Bank, No. 19 Madison-st., collapsed at 10 o'clock this morning, burying a number of persons in the wreckage. So far as known, only one person, a negro porter, remains under the debris. The other victims were quickly rescued by the fire and police departments. Joseph Fischer, a tailor, who had a shop in the building, is the only person known to have sustained serious injuries. He was badly mashed about the body, but will recover.

PRAISES CITY'S SCHOOLS. San Francisco's Superintendent Ad- vices Improved Truant Institution.

William H. Langdon, Superintendent of Schools of San Francisco, is in this city making a study of the New-York schools. His visit here is part of a two months' itinerary, which includes an inspection of the important school systems of the United States. He spent several days in Memphis, New-York, Cleveland, St. Louis and Chicago, and will give the remainder of his time to this city and Boston. Mr. Langdon said yesterday:

I have come East to study the systems of the Eastern cities in their provision for the care of truant children by the establishment of juvenile courts and juvenile detention centers. San Francisco is so far ahead of the rest of the country in this respect that I have even visited the city and returned to my own city with a study of what you have done in the East, we shall aim to meet our needs in the way of a parental boarding school in the coming year. We also have the Oriental race problem in Chicago, toward the solution of which I have watched with interest every step of Southern cities to handle efficiently the great negro problem.

GIRL SAVES A WORKMAN. Daughter of a Clergyman Drags Him from the Path of a Car.

Miss Beatrice Quennell, daughter of the Rev. Robert G. Quennell, of 133 West Eleventh-st., saved Thomas O'Neill from serious injury yesterday afternoon, after he had been thrown from the seat of a wagon and tossed unconsistently in the path of a sixth-ave. car. The accident was at Thirty-eighth-st. and Sixth-ave. O'Neill had struck his head against an elevated pillar.

IN HOBOKEN QUICKSAND. Man Nearly Loses His Life in Mire at Street Corner.

Peter Griffin, of No. 71 Adams-st., Hoboken, is in a critical condition in St. Mary's Hospital as the result of having been caught in a quicksand at Eleventh and Madison sts. last night. One life was lost several years ago at the same spot, and several persons have had narrow escapes.
