

12 B. R. T. NOT FAVORABLE.

Believed To Be Opposed to Short Term Lease for Loop.

Although President Winter, of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, would not indicate in any way that the answer of his company would be to the proposition that the lease of the proposed loop between the Manhattan ends of the bridge be limited to five years, it was learned from other sources that the company does not look with much favor on the short term lease.

The interests of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and the city are identical in the matter. The city would not pay for the interest of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company to continue operating the B. R. T. I do not believe that any quibbling as to the extension of a year or two of the five year limit will be allowed to stand in the way of an agreement being reached between the city and the railroad company.

President Littleton says that twenty-eight boards of trade and other civic and business organizations have passed resolutions in favor of the loop connecting the city. He is in receipt of scores of letters advocating the idea.

MORE EQUIPMENT FOR ROCK ISLAND.

Chicago, March 3.—Efforts on a large scale are being made to meet demands of increasing traffic west of Chicago, according to a statement issued today by John Sebastian, passenger traffic manager of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway.

The statement says that to provide for increased volume of traffic on Rock Island lines there will be delivered this month twenty new pattern passenger cars and sixty-five locomotives, and an order is in for more than four thousand freight cars, of various kinds, and for fifty locomotives, and the amount of those already mentioned.
