RUSSIAN NIHILISTS.

Mme. Breshkovsky Addresses "Friends of Russia."

If the audience which crowded Berkeley Hall, No. 23 West 44th-st., yesterday, really expected that Mme. Breshkovsky would tell them the story of her "Twenty Years in Siberia," they were disappointed.

In particular she combated the notion that the present dissatisfaction is confined to a little group of people, malcontents and marplots, called nihilists.

"Whoever is inspired by humanitarian principles, and tries to disseminate knowledge or help the peasant, is ipso facto, an enemy to the government in Russia.

Although Mme. Breshkovsky belongs to the organization one arm of which is credited with the murder of Von Plehve and Grand Duke Sergius, she does not look the least bit like the traditional fire-eater.



Committee Takes the Word Tentative from the Plans.

Controller Grout announced yesterday that the tentative plans for new subways reported on February 28 had been adopted by the committee on plan and scope of the Rapid Transit Commission with unimportant changes, and that the plans as printed in The Tribune on March 1 would be reported to the Rapid Transit Commission to-day for adoption.

the meeting to-day, and the Mayor will not vote on the subway plans, because they will come to him for official approval after they have been sent to the aldermen.

Man Arrested in Hampton, Va.—To Be Brought Back. Montclair, N. J., March 8 (Special). Chief of Police Henry Galland and Detective Hammett, of County Prosecutor Young's office, of Newark, left this evening for Hampton, Va., to establish the identity of the man arrested in that city on suspicion of having murdered Mrs. Hannah B. Ross on the morning of February 23. Last night, when the chief had been informed by telegraph of the man's arrest, he talked over the telephone with Sheriff Curtis, of Hampton, and satisfied himself that the man is the missing coachman. The description given tallies in every particular with that given by a number of persons who knew the fugitive.

THE COLORADO CONTEST. Vote Shows Peabody's Strength 42—Opposition, 52. Denver, March 8.—A vote taken to-day by the General Assembly of Colorado, meeting in joint session to consider the contest for the Governorship, established the fact that of the four reports submitted by the contest committee, none would receive a majority at the present time.



Tomb Placed in the Institution He Founded.

Washington, March 8.—Within the walls of the Smithsonian Institution, which he founded, the body of James Smithson has found a temporary resting place, which will eventually become a shrine for the beneficiaries of his gift.

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ARMY AND NAVY NEWS.

CAVALRY NOT TO BE SACRIFICED.—The general staff of the army and the chief of staff, General Chaffee, have advised, probably permanently, the project for creating more artillery from cavalry. It has been decided finally and officially that nothing can be accomplished for the good of the service by taking from one branch of the service and giving to another.

NO NAVAL ORDINANCE CORPS.—The scheme of establishing a special and independent ordinance corps for the navy is temporarily blocked by the difficulty in obtaining the officers who have been designated for this exclusive duty and of getting additional officers needed to carry out the plans of the chief of ordinance of the navy.
