**PRINCIPALS MUST PAY.**

**Education Board Will Not Provide for Ill Pupils.**

Medical attendance for pupils who may become ill in the public schools is to depend on the finances of the principal's pocketbook and the willingness of physicians to take a chance on getting a fee.

Principal John H. Denbigh of the Morris High School wrote to Associate City Superintendent Stevens a few days ago, telling him that in a recent accident to a pupil in the gymnasium medical aid could not be obtained until the teacher who went for help assumed responsibility for paying the doctor. The physician took this stand because there is no medical fund provided for in the bylaws of the Board of Education.

The superintendents' subcommittee on school management returned a report on the principal's letter, saying:

Your committee is of the opinion that it is inexpedient to empower principals generally (even if it were legally feasible) to bind the city to payment of the bills of a physician whom they might in some cases perhaps inconsiderately and unnecessarily summon to the schools.

Under the general imperative obligation to safeguard the pupils, it is the duty of a principal in time of need to summon one or more physician if necessary, and when this duty has been performed in a proper cause the Board of Education may be relied upon to take such action as the law and equities of the case will permit.

The committee has great faith in the stretching qualities of the principals' pocketbooks and physicians' love of work without pay.

**MOB ASSAILS MOTORMAN.**

**Held at Bay by Switch Bar—Car Kills Boy.**

An angry crowd of several hundred persons gathered about a car of the Park-ave. line after it had killed Frederick Von Gilder, three years old, in front of his home, at No. 87 Park-ave., Williamsburg, yesterday, and threatened the motorman, James F. McCauley, of No. 18 Snetiker-ave. By swinging the switching bar in front of him he was able to keep the crowd back until the police reserves arrived.

The boy was standing beside the tracks as the car neared him. The motorman put on the brakes and rang the gong. The boy suddenly darted in front of the car and was knocked on the fender. He rolled from the fender and was mangled under the wheels.

The crowd was crying "Lynch him" and "Kill him!" when Policeman Pagan jumped to the platform beside the motorman. Together they kept the crowd back until the other policeman arrived. McCauley was held on a charge of homicide.

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**CRAIN RESENTS CENSURE.**

**Says Allen-st. House Was Inspected—Mr. de Forest Criticised.**

When Commissioner T. C. T. Crain was asked yesterday if he had any comment to make about the verdict of the coroner's jury which censured the conduct of the Tenement House Department, he said:

The censure of the jury was unwarranted, in that it had before it no evidence as to how often No. 105 Allen-st. had been inspected. It was inspected fourteen times between September 1, 1904, and March 14, 1905. The law requires a monthly inspection. It was inspected on an average of nearly twice every month. Most of the inspections were made by inspectors appointed by my predecessor and under rules of inspection which he formulated. No. 105 Allen-st. was not inspected once in the corresponding months in the administration of my predecessor.

Acting Buildings Commissioner Gorman said:

If the coroner's jury censured this department it didn't know what it was doing. This department has absolutely no jurisdiction over tenement houses.

Robert W. de Forest, who preceded Mr. Crain, refused to discuss the subject.

**FIRE DEPT. AIDS JEROME.**

**Theatres Which Have Barred Mr. Parsons to Admit Him.**

District Attorney Jerome and Acting Chief Blinn of the Fire Department, had a conference yesterday about theatres. There are some theatres which the District Attorney's investigators cannot enter, but the Fire Department can go into all. It is understood that through pressure brought by the Fire Department, H. De B. Parsons, the District Attorney's investigator, will now be allowed to inspect certain theatres, which have barred him.

Some days ago Mr. Jerome stated that the safest theatre in the city was the New Lyceum. A representative of Thompson & Dundy yesterday convinced the District Attorney that the Colonial Music Hall is just as safe.

**RAINS FILL WATERSHED.**

**Supply in New Croton Dam Now About 100 Feet Deep.**

J. Waldo Smith, chief engineer of the Aqueduct Commission, said yesterday that the heavy rains in the last two weeks had sent a large volume into the Croton watershed, and that the water is now about 100 feet deep in the new Croton Dam. The new Croton Dam is several miles further down the valley than the old dam, which supplies the city with water. The old dam catches all the water in the Croton Valley north, and the new dam, until the old dam fills to overflowing, gets only the rainfall in the watershed between the old and the new dams or an area of about two thousand acres.

The water in the new dam will not be used, because the bottom of the dam is more or less covered with vegetable growth, and there is no need of drawing on the supply in the new dam until it rises to the height of the supply in the old reservoir. The water in the new dam will have to rise to a height of about 150 feet before it backs the water over the top of the old dam.

From this time forward the supply in the new dam will not increase in depth so rapidly, as the area covered by the water is greater than the watershed. It is estimated by the engineers that it will take a year or two for the new dam to fill. The supply in the new dam would be good for about twenty days at this time, if the city had to use it.
