BLOODY DAY IN WARSAW.

A HUNDRED SHOT DOWN.

Wanton Murder by Troops Reported—Workmen Using Bombs.

Warsaw, May 1.—Nearly one hundred people were killed or wounded in disturbances in various quarters of Warsaw to-day. The troops apparently were uncontrollable and violated all orders to act with moderation.

May Day opened with every prospect that the recent gloomy forebodings would find contradiction in a peaceful ending. Glorious weather ushered in the beginning of the celebrations, and all factories, shops and offices of every description were closed.

The first disturbances occurred between 1 and 2 o'clock p. m. when a procession of several thousand workmen carrying red flags marched along Zelazna-st. The demonstration was orderly and proceeded without molestation for some distance.

ALL CLASSES EMBITTERED. The shooting is described as having been entirely unprovoked. It has aroused the most intense indignation among all classes in Warsaw.

Another terrible scene was enacted at 5 p. m. at Ziota and Sosnowe sts., when workmen fired from behind a wall at a patrol, which immediately opened fire on the passing crowds, killing or wounding twenty persons.

SEVERAL AFFAIRS IN LODZ. It was reported by telephone from Lodz this afternoon that a crowd there had stoned a military patrol, whereupon the soldiers fired and killed two men and wounded a boy.
