

THE EQUITABLE INQUIRY. H. R. WINTHROP TESTIFIES

Messrs. Hyde and Tarbell Also Examined—Purchases from Syndicate.

Testimony by Henry Rogers Wintthrop, assistant secretary of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, who is also secretary of the executive and finance committees, occupied yesterday at the inquiry of Superintendent Hendricks of the State Insurance Department.

In the Lord suit, it will be remembered, James H. Hyde intervened, and through Samuel Untermyer, his attorney, announced his desire to have the mutualization plan carried through, but according to law. In other words, he insisted on the consent of three-fifths of the stock being registered in favor of amendments to the society's charter, and opposed the position taken by President Alexander through his attorney, William B. Hornblower, that under Section 52 of the Insurance Law directors could mutualize the society without reference of the plan to the stockholders.

It was said yesterday that in addition to the 502 shares of Equitable stock held by the Henry B. Hyde estate, James H. Hyde personally owns about two hundred shares, which had never been transferred to his name on the society's books.

The total of these two amounts, about seven hundred shares, is well in excess of three-fifths of the whole number of shares, so that Mr. Hyde could at any time, it is asserted, if he chose, put through the plan of mutualization. The holdings of President Alexander and his associates are said to aggregate about seventy shares, which, added to the Hyde estate holdings, would be less than three-fifths of the whole one thousand shares.

The examination was interrupted at luncheon time, so Wintthrop could gather other documents and compile some figures regarding profits which Mr. Hendricks required. Meantime, a meeting of the executive committee of the society was held at which the warring factions met. Luncheon, served in the board room, saw the investigators represented by Mr. Frick and the investigated eating together peacefully.

Mr. Wintthrop's testimony was chiefly in explanation of the records which he produced, and the transactions of the finance department of the Equitable, of which he is the manager. Mr. Hendricks's questions were directed toward finding out what purchases were made by the society from the underwriting syndicate of James H. Hyde and associates, Mr. Hyde's personal connection with the various corporations whose securities the Equitable holds was explained.

Mr. Wintthrop was asked, it is reported, to tell what directors were interested in the subsidiary companies of the Equitable and what profits each had made from the interchanges of business and the sale of securities to the society.

While Mr. Wintthrop was testifying Deputy Superintendent Hunter went to the office of Thomas D. Jordan, the controller of the society, where they held a long conference. Books and papers of the Equitable were examined. It is not certain that there will be a hearing to-day. Superintendent Hendricks and his counsel both want to get back to Syracuse. Mr. Hyde and Gage E. Tarbell were examined for a short time, it was said. If the inquiry continues to-day Mr. Hyde and Mr. Tarbell may be recalled. Jacob H. Schiff and E. H. Harriman are scheduled for early witnesses, it is understood.

DAMAGE BY ELEVATED RAILROAD.

Justice Gaylor Says L. I. R. R. Must Pay for It Before Trains Run.

By awarding damages to Mrs. Ella H.
