

EX-CONVICT KILLS WIFE. PURSUED BY HIS SONS.

John Johnson, an ex-Sing Sing convict, shot his wife, Catherine Johnson, dead last night on the steps of her father's home, No. 13 Mott Street, York. Twenty minutes afterward, while the police were hunting for him, Johnson walked into Headquarters, smoking a cigar, and gave himself up.

He told Captain Woodruff that he had shot his wife because she would not live with him. "Ever since I got out of Sing Sing," said he, "she would not have anything to do with me, and I got tired of it. I had desired to make a home for my two boys, and live an honorable life with her. She said I was sitting on the front step with another woman. I told her I wanted to speak with her. She said I could speak to her where she was sitting. Then, I lost my temper."

CHIEF CROKER QUITS AUTOMOBILE.

Chief Croker of the Fire Department answered a call to a fire at No. 44 Fulton-st. last night in his big red automobile. The fire was a trivial affair, and the Chief started back to his headquarters. The automobile went fifty feet, and with an expiring "chug, chu, chu-u-u" came to a dead stop.

Hervey Wood, of the National Temperance Society, was passed at the Baptist Ministers' Conference at the 23rd Street branch of the Young Men's Christian Association yesterday, asking Governor Higgins not to sign the bill which would legalize the liquor tax certificate of the Hotel St. Regis. The bill exempts hotels having over two hundred rooms from the prohibition of a license to sell liquor within 200 feet of a church.
