APRIL IMMIGRATION. Ellis Island Received 108,438 Aliens—Records Broken.

Washington, May 29.—In the month of April, according to the official figures given at the Bureau of Immigration to-day, 108,438 immigrants landed at Ellis Island. The total number of aliens who landed at all the ports of the United States was 137,694. Baltimore showed the largest number of arrivals, next to New-York, with 11,829 arrivals; Boston followed with 6,831, and Philadelphia with 2,244. April's grand total of 137,694 breaks all records for the fourth month of the year, the only April nearly approaching it being that of 1903, when 128,286 were landed.

ARMY AND NAVY NEWS.

SANTIAGO BATTLE MONUMENT.—Colonel Webb Hayes, of the commission to mark by suitable monuments the positions on the battlefield of Santiago, conferred at the War Department to-day with the Hon. Secretary of War, Taft, on the program for the monument, which was to have taken place on July 1, the seventh anniversary of the battle. The monument is to be dedicated to the memory of the 10th Cavalry, the 9th Infantry and the Alaskan expedition of Lieutenant General Chace, whose attack is desired at the dedication, that ceremony will be postponed until next fall, at a date to be announced.

SUITS NOT TO CAUSE DELAY, HE SAYS. R. E. Robinson Declares Work on Westchester Road Will Begin Next Monday. R. E. Robinson, of the New-York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company, yesterday denied that work on the proposed road would be delayed by the improvement company, or by suits of other corporations. Speaking of the suits yesterday, Mr. Robinson said:

TO INVESTIGATE IRRIGATION PROJECT. A Long Trip To Be Made by Senate and House Committees. Chicago, May 29.—All arrangements have been completed by the Harriman lines for carrying the United States Senate and the House Committee on Irrigation and Arid Lands on an extensive trip in the West to investigate the irrigation projects and the necessity for work on the part of the government. The party will leave Kansas City on June 1 and go direct to El Paso, Tex. From El Paso the committee will go to Los Angeles, and various California regions will be inspected. San Francisco will be reached on Saturday, and closed by the American Express on Sunday. Then the party will go to Nevada, Utah, Oregon and Washington. From Seattle the party will work east through Montana and down to Colorado, completing the trip at Denver on July 6.

IN FRENCH COLONIES. How They Are Plundered and Natives Degraded.

San Francisco, May 29 (Special).—Professor L. G. Seurat, who has been in the South Sea studying social, moral and political conditions in the groups owned by France, has just left San Francisco on his way to Paris. He is more than three years Professor Seurat, an educator, under the name of Public Instruction of France at the Sorbonne, has been studying the French South Sea colonies, making his headquarters in the Gambier Group, though spending much time at Papeete and throughout the Paumotu, the Marquesas and the French possessions generally.

GRAND JURY PROBING STRIKE. Investigating Charges of Bribery in Chicago—Little Rioting Reported. Chicago, May 29.—Renewed aggressiveness on the part of the employers whose teamsters are on strike is expected on Wednesday. Taking advantage of the legal holiday which will come tomorrow, plans will be formed for extensively increasing the amount of deliveries to be made from lumber yards. The downtown business houses where strikes exist have 400 unemployed drivers. These they cannot use on account of the inability of the police to furnish protection, and on Wednesday men will be sent to the firms in the lumber yards.

REPORT OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. Review of Staples of Imports and Exports Given with Statistics. The forty-seventh annual report of the Chamber of Commerce, which has just been issued, is an usual, divided into two parts, the first containing the proceedings of the chamber for the year ended April 30, 1905, and the second presenting trade reviews and statistical tables of trade and finance of the city, State and nation. The annual review discusses the principal subjects which have engaged the attention of the chamber during the year, first in the list coming Rapid Transit, and among other topics being the proposed Interstate Commission and State canals. In the review of "staples of imports and exports" statistics of industries and of trade movements are given in part as follows:

Imports of merchandise, \$391,067,371; imports of the precious metals, \$28,824,371; exports of domestic goods, \$1,417,523,000; and for the year ended April 30, 1905, and the second presenting trade reviews and statistical tables of trade and finance of the city, State and nation.

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RUMOR OF SETTLEMENT. Talk Here of Outside Influence in Chicago Strike.

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BIG SUGAR INVESTMENT. Americans Investing \$15,000,000 In Cuba.

Fully \$15,000,000 of United States capital is to be expended in the development and extension of operations in sugar plantations in Cuba. The most important new proposition is that of the Nipe Bay company, a concern which has the backing of interests identical with those in control of the United States Fruit Company. Andrew W. Preston is president.
