The peace envoys settled the last disputed point of the treaty, and the remaining work, according to Baron Rosen, is for the clerks.


CLERKS CAN DO THE REST Treaty Contains Seventeen Articles and Four Appendices.

Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 2.—The last point of the peace party in dispute was arranged at a meeting of the Russian and Japanese plenipotentiaries which ended at 11 o'clock to-night.

CAPTAIN GETS 6 MONTHS. Former Member of Police Force Sentenced for "Grafting."

Pittsburg, Sept. 2.—Former Police Captain James Wilson of Allegheny, who was convicted of "grafting," and who resigned his position pending argument for a new trial, was sentenced to-day to six months in the Allegheny County workhouse and also to pay a fine of \$100.

APPEARS AFTER 28 YEARS. Goes to Court to Prevent Division of Estate for Wife.

Pittsburg, Sept. 2.—There was much surprise in the Allegheny County Orphans' court room this morning, when John Fulton, formerly of Pittsburg, now of Paterson, N. J., who has not been in Pittsburg for twenty-eight years, appeared to fight the petition of Mrs. Mary Fulton, who sought to have her husband declared dead so that she could distribute his estate.

EX-MAYOR FELLS JUDGE. Assault Occasioned by Light Sentence of a Negro.

Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 2.—A special dispatch to "The Observer" from Durham, N. C., says that M. E. McCown, ex-Mayor of Durham, assaulted Judge George W. Ward, of the 1st Judicial District, to-night, knocking him down. The assault was occasioned by the imposition of a two years' sentence on Allen Haskins, a negro, by Judge Ward at the afternoon session.

DECLARES PRESIDENT SHOULD RUN. THE FASTEST LONG-DISTANCE TRAIN.

Pittsburg, Sept. 2.—"The Pittsburg Leader" to-morrow will have a column editorial lauding Roosevelt for President for 1908. The paper insists that no declaration be accepted, saying: "His own will in the matter has now ceased to have force."

BOARD GOING TO ISTHMUS. Panama Consulting Engineers Will Accept Invitation of Mr. Shonts.

Washington, Sept. 2.—The Board of Consulting Engineers of the Panama Canal, to-day discussed various details of organization. The special committee on procedure appointed yesterday made a partial report. While no formal action has been taken, it has been practically determined that the board will accept the invitation of Chairman Shonts to visit the isthmus the last of the month, when the commission meets at Panama.

FEVER RIOT THREATENED. Mob of Italians Ready to Burn Hospital at Patterson, La.

NEW ORLEANS FEVER RECORD. New cases yesterday... 37. Total cases to date... 1,995. Deaths yesterday... 3. Total deaths to date... 284.

New-Orleans, Sept. 2.—A telegram from Patterson, La., to the State Board of Health, announces an uprising of Italians against the fever treatment of the physicians in charge. A great crowd of the foreigners has surrounded the emergency hospital, threatening to burn it down with all the patients.

FEVER IN ATLANTA. Health Officer Announces Genuine Case of "Yellow Jack."

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 2.—Dr. J. P. Kennedy, City Health Officer of Atlanta, to-day announced officially that one case of yellow fever has developed here. The patient is John C. Carruthers, a mechanic, who arrived here Thursday from Pensacola. He was taken to the detention hospital outside the city limits yesterday, and the case was diagnosed as yellow fever to-day.

PRESIDENT TO START BALL GAME. Big Entertainment Planned for Benefit of Yellow Fever Fund.

New-Orleans, Sept. 2.—A baseball game will be played here September 16 for the benefit of the yellow fever fund. Arrangements were completed to-day by which President Roosevelt will touch an electric wire at Sagamore Hill and start the play.

CHOLERA ON CONTINENT. NO CAUSE FOR ALARM. A Steady Increase and High Mortality in Germany.

Berlin, Sept. 2.—The record to-night stands at fifty-one cholera cases and nineteen deaths, a steady increase and a high percentage of mortality. The most uneasy news for America is that a second case exists at Hamburg. It was officially reported late this afternoon that a laborer in St. George's Hospital, where the Russian emigrant died, has cholera, but it is added that the seizure is of a milder form than the previous one.

STEAMER HITS LAUNCH. Owner and Brother-in-Law Rescued by City of Hudson.

William Zanker, of No. 364 West 120th-st., and his thirteen-year-old brother-in-law, Albert Winston, nearly lost their lives in the launch Helene, which was struck amidship by the City of Hudson, off Hastings Friday night, and crushed like a cockleshell.

MR. TAFT AT HONG KONG. Visit to Canton Abandoned—City Placarded Against Americans.

Hong Kong, Sept. 2.—Secretary Taft and his party, including Miss Alice Roosevelt, have arrived here. They will remain three days. The Governor of Hong Kong, Sir Matthew Nathan, and the British colony are entertaining the visitors.
