

LUMINOUS LEADING. A Useful Guide to Philosophical Study.

THE APPROACH TO PHILOSOPHY. By Ralph Barton Perry. Ph. D. 12mo, pp. xxiv, 448. Charles Scribner's Sons.

A great many introductions to philosophy have been written. Many of them might rather be called "warnings against the study of philosophy," for they often make the subject hideously obscure.

The book is divided into three parts: First, Approach to the Problem of Philosophy; second, The Special Problems of Philosophy; third, Systems of Philosophy.

The book will be of service to a large class of readers who, while seeking information about the history and nature of philosophy, prefer an informal to a technical and formal treatment of the subject.

The author modestly avows his debt to his teachers and colleagues at Harvard, and he shows a marked sympathy with the thought of both Royce and James.

This doctrine is historically connected with Kant's doctrine of the "primacy of the practical reason," in which he maintained that the consciousness of duty is a profounder truth than scientific insight into the knowledge of objects.

A very large part of the book is taken up with discussions concerning the philosophical aspects of religion, and it is in this respect that the author appears to least advantage.

To be religious is to believe that a certain correlation of forces, moral and factual, is in reality operative, and that it determines the propriety and effectiveness of a certain type of living.

If this be true, in what sense may the Italian peasant at the mass, or the Methodist devotee at a revival, be said to be religious?

There are, however, beliefs in which there is no essential content of emotion or will. A Catholic may believe that in Christ there were two natures and one person.

A complete table of contents, a snail but well considered bibliography, and an excellent index enhance the value of this work.
