TO END MAIL STRIKE.

Conference To Be Held To-day Expected to Effect Settlement.

The end of the mail drivers' strike is expected to-morrow, when there will be a conference under the auspices of the City Federation between the strike leaders and the contractors, with a view to a settlement. Both sides gave their version of the trouble yesterday to Ralph M. Easley, chairman of the national executive body of the federation, and a conference was afterward held by the strike leaders, headed by Edwin Gould, first vice-president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. The strike leaders were urged by Mr. Easley to call off the strike pending arbitration, but would not entertain the proposition.

Later in the day a longer conference was held, in which committees of both sides took part. The conference was conducted in a friendly spirit, but no conclusion was reached. It was then arranged to meet again to-morrow.

According to the contractors, there was less interference by the strikers yesterday than on Friday. It was stated at the tables that there were no desertions during the day. The strike sympathizers were quieter than usual, on account of the new machinery reaching them that negotiations for a settlement were under way.

F. E. Rooney, general superintendent of mail delivery, said that all the mail was being delivered. The postoffice looked to the contractors for the delivery of the mail.

"Matters are proceeding nearly as smoothly as if there was no strike," he said. "In fact, no one would think there was a strike."

The contractor, C. H. Wolcott, he said, was under \$200,000 bonds for due delivery of the mails. It would require an unusual combination of circumstances, however, to involve the forfeiture of all these bonds.

According to Delegate Ashton, of the executive committee of the New-York locals of the Teamsters, only forty wagons were in commission. Every mail wagon was still guarded by a policeman.

Samuel Beyer, twenty-six years old, of No. 157 Forsyth-st., was the third victim of the strikers. He was shot in the back and chest by the strikers following the men when they were through work. They found them in a place convenient for assault.

Many of the new drivers are horsemen who during the summer in the Bow War were stranded by the failure of the show, and went and to find the strikers.
