U. S. STATUTES REVISED.

Commission Has Completed Work on the Laws of the Nation.

Washington, Sept. 10.—The commission to revise the laws of which Alexander C. Botkin, of Montana, is chairman, has practically completed the tremendous and highly important task which was conferred on it four years ago...

The new work will embrace all the law now contained in the old set of Revised Statutes, the two supplementary volumes and approximately 4,710 pages of statutes at large...

There is a prevailing impression that the commission charged with the revision of the laws has been engaged on this important work for eight years, but that impression is incorrect...

The actual revision is now practically completed, and the Government Printing Office is engaged in printing the successive titles...
