CHICAGO STRIKE BREWS.

Railroads Say "No" to Freight Handlers, and Prepare to Fight.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Demands of the members of the Freight Handlers' Union, of Chicago, for an increase of 10 per cent in wages or an arbitration of their demands and the demand for a conference were refused to-day. The general managers of the twenty-two railroads centering in Chicago notified P. J. Flannery, president of the union, that negotiations were ended.

The news of the refusal of the general managers to grant the increase in wages, or arbitrate their dispute, and of the declaration to hold a conference was received angrily. The men immediately arranged to call mass meetings to consider the action of the roads.

Notwithstanding a feeling of confidence, said to have resulted after individual interviews with employees, that there will be no strike, the railroad companies are going ahead with preparations for one. The preparations are precautionary. Cots are being hauled to the freight houses and hundreds of men have been hired should they vote to strike.

Mr. Collins, Chief of Police, will furnish police protection for the freight houses. One of the general managers said: "While it looks like trouble, we are confident that the men do not want to strike."

AMERICAN TROLLEYS AT PARA.
