

SEEK N. Y. LIFE PROXIES

Guess as to Possible Successor to President Orr.

The agents of the New-York Life Insurance Company are busy all over the country getting blanket proxies from policyholders to be used at the annual election next April.

John A. McCall has a wonderful hold on the agents of the company, and many of them say he ought to be elected.

Every policyholder who calls at the home office on Broadway, or at any of the branch offices, receives a printed blank proxy, which reads as follows:

Know all men by these presents that I, of the New-York Life Insurance Company, do hereby constitute and appoint John A. McCall, my true and lawful attorney, for me and in my name, place and stead, to attend and vote at the annual election of trustees of the New-York Life Insurance Company, to be held on the 24th day of April next, and to do all such things as he may see fit to do in relation to the said election, and to execute all such powers as he may see fit to exercise in relation to the said election.

The three named in the official proxy are trustees of the company, and Clarence H. Mackay is a member of the Fowler committee. The general agents, who yesterday closed a convention at Lakewood, were urged to get every policyholder in their districts to sign this proxy and, it is said, that enough of them will undoubtedly be secured to carry the election, in spite of the efforts of Thomas M. Lawson and others.

All who called at the cashier's window at the New-York Life headquarters in this city were asked to sign a proxy. Many did so without question, while others murmured.

"It is the wish of President Orr," was one of the arguments used.

The Armstrong committee will meet this morning with members of the National Insurance Commissioners' Association, and the report which the Armstrong committee has practically completed will be gone over.

Zeno M. Host, Insurance Commissioner of Wisconsin, is at the Manhattan Hotel. He said:

The best remedy for all the ills in the life insurance business is actual annual accounting and a distributive surplus to policyholders. The next important step is to limit the expense of new business by prohibiting excessive commissions to agents for securing new business.

E. A. Woods of Pittsburg, the Equitable general agent in the Pittsburg field, was in the city yesterday for a conference with President Paul Morton. He reported that in 1905 his agency had written \$12,437,000 of insurance, of which \$2,069,000 was written in the month of December. This represented a loss of only 18 per cent over 1904.

It was learned yesterday that William H. McIntyre, the former fourth vice-president of the Equitable, was now in Baltimore, where he was registered at the Hotel Stafford. Mr. McIntyre has kept out of the State since the legislative inquiry into life insurance began.

DEPRECATES PHILIPPINE BILL. President Moore of Protective League, Hopes Senate Will Kill Measure.

"I regret exceedingly that the Philippine Tariff bill has passed the House of Representatives," said Charles A. Moore, president of the American Protective Tariff League, in an address at the annual meeting of the league at No. 323 Broadway, yesterday.

That the Philippine Tariff bill, passed by the House of Representatives on January 18, 1906, will be defeated in the Senate, indeed, I have such information from different members of the Senate as leads me to express great encouragement to the industrialists who will be injured by this bill that the proposed measure will not become a law.

PASTORS IN SYMPATHY. Methodist Clergymen and Printers Confer Over Strike.

In response to the Macedonian appeal for help sent by Typographical Union No. 6 to the clergy of the Methodist Church on Wednesday, about ten Methodist ministers held a conference with representatives of the union and the chapel of the Methodist Book Concern yesterday.

Some of the Methodist clergymen took the floor, but they did not agree as to the merits or demerits of the strike. The principal speaker was the Rev. R. L. Cooke, book editor for the Methodist Episcopal Church, who hailed the union over the coals for putting a concern which is designed for charitable purposes, rather than for profit, on the same level as printing firms which are run for individual profit.

One of the members of the union spoke, and then the Rev. A. E. Barrett, of the Tremont Methodist Episcopal Church, took the floor. He differed from Mr. Cooke. He believed in union conditions, he said, and in his opinion the fact that the Methodist Book Concern was started for philanthropic purposes did not give it the right to treat its employees less liberally than private firms.

A majority of those attending, if more than one shall attend, this proxy shall be done by virtue hereof. All of the powers of this proxy may be exercised by such one of said persons as may be designated in the proxy, or by any of them, or by a majority of those attending, if more than one shall attend. This proxy shall be valid for the duration of the election of trustees from this date. I hereby revoke all my former proxies.
