Steam Racer Makes Fast Time on Coney Island Boulevard.

What may turn out to be a new automobile speed wonder was tried out yesterday morning on the Coney Island Boulevard, and was timed by Alexander Schuch, of the Long Island Automobile Club, and Theodore E. Hastings, of the Brooklyn Motor Cycle Club.

The machine used by Marriott, the new flyer is steam driven, and was designed by George Cannon, a Harvard student, last summer, but has been improved by two New Yorkers, who constructed a Y-shaped wind shield for it and also geared it much higher.

The machine weighs 2,160 pounds, and has a wheel base of 112 inches. The wheels are wood, and are fitted with racing tires. The machine carries 200 lbs. of water, and is capable of carrying 500 lbs. of steam each, or a total of 1,500 pounds.
