Hempstead, Long Island, April 14.—Regardless of a sprained wrist that compelled him to keep his arm in a sling, J. J. Lieper, of the White Marsh Hunt Club, who rode with the Meadow Brook pack today, handled his mount so cleverly with his handicap that he outdrew a large field, and managed to be one of the first in at the death in one of the best and longest drag hunts held on Long Island for a long time.
