




Scenes on the North River, Where the American and French Fleets Are Anchored

MITCHELL IN CONTROL. Miners' Delegates Instructed to Follow His Advice.

Wilkes-Barre, Penn., April 29.—President Mitchell is awaiting the reports of union officers throughout the region on the feeling of the men regarding the refusal of the operators to grant their wage propositions.

The delegates who are now being elected are in the main being instructed to follow the advice of President Mitchell, and if he advocates a strike, to vote for a strike.

The first pronounced effect of the operators' reply was apparent last night, when a mob attacked seventy workers at the new Sayre colliery of the Lehigh Valley Coal company, near Mount Carmel.

There was a general impression yesterday that the anthracite operators' committee of seven would issue a statement replying to the allegations of President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers, one of which was that the coal companies charged exorbitant freight rates.

It was said in behalf of the operators last evening: "Considering everything, this statement comes with bad grace from Mr. Mitchell. The operators had offered to submit their books to show their rates, and Mr. Mitchell did not see fit to take advantage of this offer."

The situation is clearing up in the coal market in this city, at least as far as domestic anthracite is concerned. There is little demand for domestic anthracite, on account of the warm weather and the approach of summer.

A FROST FOR DOWIE. Voliva's Meeting Draws Followers from That of Deposed Prophet.

Chicago, April 29.—John Alexander Dowie, standing unsteadily before an audience of 2,500 persons in Zion Tabernacle this afternoon, called upon his tradurers, if any were present, to make their accusations before the whole congregation.

Those who listened to Dowie were for the most part visitors. In front of the platform and in the choir loft were probably one hundred and fifty faithful Dowieites.

Dowie was borne to the platform by two stalwart negro attendants and deposited upon his feet before the elaborate altar. He was dressed in a new apostolic robe of white, gold and purple.

They say I've taken the people's money. Do you believe it?" he asked. Answers of "Yes" and "No!" came from different parts of the audience.

Then it was that Dowie arose and demanded that any of those present who had anything to charge against him should make the charge. No one offered to accuse him.

NO MONEY IN 'FRISCO. PARIS AN ARMED CAMP.

Banks Closed and Financial Conditions Alarming. MORE TROOPS ARRIVING. Premier Warns Strikers—Two Attempts at Violence.

San Francisco, April 29.—James D. Phelan, chairman of the municipal finance committee, to-day gave out the following statement: "The demands on the finance committee are very great, and we do not see how we can meet them if the conditions continue."

Paris, April 29.—Premier Sarrien, in a speech delivered here to-day, gave warning to the disorderly element that the government proposed to deal firmly with any outbreaks on May 1.

The first duty of a government worthy of the name is to insure order in the streets and freedom to work without interruption. We are resolved to apply the law without passion and without weakness to all disturbers of the peace.

The city is assuming a distinctly military aspect. Military patrols have not yet been established, but soldiers off duty through the boulevards, suggesting the days of the Boulanger excitement.

The Military Governor of Paris has requisitioned the big buildings of the Trovill Vauxhall for military uses. This building ordinarily is used for meetings of the revolutionary party.

Crowds to-day visited the Champs de Mars to witness the cavalry and infantry drills. Several persons distributing anti-military pamphlets were arrested in the course of the day.

Seven thousand workmen of the municipal gas works to-day reached the decision not to strike, thus allaying the fears that the city would be without light.

After a meeting of printers to-day a disturbance between strikers and non-strikers took place, in the course of which a non-striker shot and seriously wounded a striker and another man lost an eye.

The striking jewellers to-day created disorders outside the establishments which are continuing to operate by endeavoring to induce the men who remain at work to join the strike.

The races were abandoned to-day on account of the police staff being engaged in Paris, and the national museums also were closed.
