BRIGADIER GENERAL JOHN C. TIDBALL. Brigadier General John Caldwell Tidball, U. S. A. (retired), first Governor of Alaska, died yesterday at his home, No. 210 Walnut street, Montclair, N. J.

WALTER A. DONALDSON.

Bloomfield, N. J., May 15 (Special).—Walter A. Donaldson, fifty-two years old for many years in the United States Naval Office in New York, and who was Collector of Customs during the Spanish-American War at Santiago de Cuba under General Shafter, died at his home in Berkeley Heights Park, Bloomfield, late this afternoon, from a cancerous growth, after an illness of about one year.

LEWIS WILLIAM WASHINGTON.

Lewis William Washington died yesterday at Nice, France, from a complication of diseases. Mr. Washington was born in Baltimore, and when young he went to the University of Maryland. His wife is the late Major James Barroll Washington, of Pittsburg, who was on the staff of General Joseph E. Johnston. James Barroll Washington was president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, Lewis Washington was vice-president of the Sheet Steel Company of Pittsburg, and on the consolidation of that company with the American Sheet Steel Company, now the United States Steel Company, Mr. Washington retired. In the fall of 1904, while in London, he married Miss Ann Raymond Cox, a sister of John Washington Cox, of this city, and while on his honeymoon contracted tuberculosis.

LUTHER MANDEN BARNEY.

Luther Manden Barney died yesterday after a long illness at his home, No. 204 Fifth avenue. He was born at Elmira, N. Y., in 1838. For many years he taught school at Volant, N. Y. In 1869 he went to Savannah, Ga., to serve as a clerk. When the war broke out he was sent with the 10th New York Cavalry as a first lieutenant in the Army of the Potomac. In 1863 he was appointed an aide-de-camp. In June of that year he was made adjutant general, and in the fall of 1864 he was promoted brigadier general.

MRS. CARRIE E. ATKINSON.

Boston, May 15.—The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions received news today of the death at Kobe, Japan, on April 18, of Mrs. Carrie E. Atkinson, wife of Dr. John L. Atkinson, and one of the oldest missionaries of the board in Japan.
