

ACCOUNTANTS WITHERS BEATS BOHEMIAN A NECK.

Big Crowd Sees Classic Stake Decided at Belmont Park.

W. Harry Brown's Accountant won the thirty-third renewal of the classic and historic Withers at Belmont Park yesterday, after a spirited drive through the stretch with James R. Keene's Bohemian.

The Westchester Racing Association entertained the biggest crowd which had ever gone down to the big and well appointed inclosure at Belmont Park.

The Withers, which is a stake for three-year-olds at weight for age at one mile, was run as the fourth race.

No time was lost at the start, and the field broke together to a good start. Jack Martin, who had the mount on Accountant, was wide awake and held his coveted position on the rail in the first wild rush from the barrier.

Miller did not ride a winner yesterday, but he heads the winning jockey list for the meeting with fourteen victories.


