

FUNERAL STRIKE BREAK

Twenty Out of Thirty-five Employers Reported to Have Settled.

Though there appeared to be a tendency on the part of the coach owners to get together yesterday and try to settle in a body with the funeral coach drivers of Local 164, who are on strike, the officers of the latter decided to have no collective settlement. President O'Brien, Mr. Smith, the business agent, and the strike committee of the union, met in the morning at Grand Suffolk Hall, No. 21 Suffolk street, and decided that there must be individual settlements or none.

PAINTERS' STRIKE BEGUN.

Many Big Buildings Affected—Six Thousand Men Out.

The strike of the Brotherhood of Painters, to enforce demands for \$4 and \$4.50 a day for plain and decorative painting, respectively, went generally into effect yesterday. Among the buildings affected were the Knickerbocker Hotel, 423 West Broadway; the Hall of Records, the new Custom House, several hotels and apartment houses, and many dwelling houses and houses of buildings uptown. In all, over three hundred buildings in Manhattan and The Bronx were affected, the strike not extending to Brooklyn.

CARPENTERS' UNION LOSES STRIKE.

Justice Gaynor, as Referee, Favors the Association of Employers.

Justice William J. Gaynor, whom the striking carpenters and their employers agreed upon as arbitrator of their differences, decided in favor of the employers yesterday. The strikers, who demanded an increase of 50 cents a day over the present scale of \$4, have been out since May 1.

All those killed or injured were negro or Italian laborers.

THIEVES FLY IN AUTO.

Strange Robbery at Yonkers Home of Julian Hawthorne.

The police yesterday reported that on Sunday afternoon three men in an automobile visited Julian Hawthorne's home, at No. 759 Warburton avenue, and stole between \$40 and \$50 in cash and much jewelry, besides ransacking every drawer in the apartments of Hendrik Hansen, janitor of the Yonkers Corinthian Yacht Club, who has been acting as caretaker of the house since the recent fire, which badly damaged it.

GOVERNOR MOLINA HONORED.

Guest at Dinner of Ibero-Americano—Hopes for Inter-American Amity.

On the eve of his departure for Europe, Governor Olegario Molina of the State of Yucatan was the guest at a dinner given him by the Ibero-Americano Club at the Hotel Marie Antoinette last night. In toasting the guest, Dr. Rafael Montufar, secretary of Public Instruction of Guatemala, congratulated the club on its opportunity of entertaining Governor Molina, which, he said, was strictly in line with the object of the club—to show members of the Spanish race that they have a home in New York.

NO FISH IN GREAT SOUTH BAY.

Native Anglers Think "Chug Chug" of Power Boats Has Driven Them Away.

Eastport, Long Island, May 21.—The introduction of the power boat on the Great South Bay is said to be gradually driving away the great schools of edible fish which at this season formerly swarmed to this section and afforded the native fishermen a profitable field of employment. Not in the history of these waters has the fishing been so unsatisfactory as this year, the catches of carp, alewives and menhaden not being one-fifth as large as in other years.

CHICAGO GETTING WORSE AND WORSE.

Chicago, May 21.—Hugo Grosser, the City Statistician, to-day made public figures showing that Chicago was naughtier last year than in 1904. In the latter year 60,344 persons were arrested, while in 1905 the police took into custody 68,967. Grosser's figures, however, show an apparent reform movement among women, 9,472 of whom were arrested in 1904, but only 9,214 last year. The statistician, however, recorded several "lady burglars" and one "lady highwayman." Americans head the percentage list of lawbreakers.

LAWYER A COUNTERFEITER.

Indianapolis, May 21.—William B. Schwartz, a member of the Minneapolis bar, was arrested to-day by federal officers on a charge of counterfeiting. Schwartz confessed to the officers and surrendered the dies he used in making the coins. His law practice, he said, did not yield a sufficient income for the support of his sick wife.

ORIENTAL TRADE NEEDS.

America Does Not Cater to Eastern Wants, Says Austin.

O. P. Austin, chief of the bureau of statistics, Department of Commerce and Labor, spoke at the monthly meeting of the Manufacturers' Association in Brooklyn last evening, on "Neglected Opportunities in Oriental Markets." He said that the Orientals have been gradually induced to accept Western goods until to-day "the manufacturers of the Western world may find in the East a market for cotton and woolen goods, lighting materials, household appliances, agricultural implements and facilities for transportation, if they will only take the trouble to make them in a form suitable to the habits and wants of Oriental people.

TO EXAMINE P. R. B. OFFICIALS.

Philadelphia, May 21.—Subpoenas have been issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission for several important officials of the Pennsylvania Railroad. They will be asked to testify concerning car distribution and gifts of coal company stock, when the commission resumes its hearings here on Wednesday.

LITTLE TRADING ON STOCK EXCHANGE.

The trading yesterday on the Stock Exchange was the lightest for any full day this year, amounting to only about 300,000 shares. The previous low record for 1906 was 410,000 shares on April 13. The smallest day's business in 1905 was 120,000 shares on June 15, and in 1904 73,831 shares on March 10.
