

ASK LARGER DIVIDENDS FIRE COMPANIES JOIN.

Wells Fargo Makes Increase—United States Also Besieged.

Among the interests which have joined in the movement to get a larger dividend return from their holdings of Wells Fargo Express Company stock, it is learned, are some of the fire insurance companies, which are naturally desirous of realizing the largest possible amounts on their investments.

It became known yesterday that a movement had been started to obtain larger dividends from the United States Express Company, as well as from the Wells Fargo. Several weeks ago representatives of several fire insurance companies—among them the Continental, which holds 2,500 shares of the stock—trust companies and estates, all stockholders of the United States Express Company, called on Senator Thomas C. Platt, president of the company, and urged that the dividend be increased.

President Platt's objection to declaring an increased dividend was that the company was erecting a skyscraper at Trinity Place and Rector street, which would cost \$2,000,000, and that it was the desire of the management to pay for the building, as it had already paid for the site, out of current earnings, the alternative being that some of the securities in which the surplus is invested would have to be sold.

The directors of Wells Fargo & Co. it was announced yesterday, have declared a semi-annual dividend of 5 per cent, placing the stock on a 10 per cent basis. The yearly dividend has, since July, 1905, been 8 per cent in the form of 2 per cent regular and 1 per cent extra each six months.

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DEFENDANTS ANSWER E. R. THOMAS. Deny Plan to Perpetuate Present International Silver Management.

Trenton, N. J., June 29.—Answers were filed in the Court of Chancery to-day by the defendants in the suit instituted by Edward R. Thomas to oust the present management of the International Silver Company by means of a decree enjoining the voting of any stock of the company held on the books or transferred to the company.

ARGUE SUGAR REBATING. Judge Holt Reserves Decision on Demurrers to Indictment.

Judge Holt, in the Special Term of the Criminal Branch of the United States Circuit Court, listened yesterday to the arguments on the demurrers interposed to the indictments in what are commonly known as the sugar rebating cases.

The indictments originally returned charged the Central Railway and the two American Sugar companies, one of New York and the other of New Jersey, with having, as corporations, granted and accepted rebates on the shipment of sugar to Edgar & Earle in Detroit, in direct violation of the Elkins act. Other

indictments, including one alleging conspiracy, were returned against Nathan S. Guilford, Frederick Pomeroy, C. Goodloe Edgar and Edwin Earle, as individuals. The American Sugar company pleaded not guilty, and will go to trial on the indictments as found. The other defendants demurred.

Mr. Fox reviewed the Elkins law, and gave what he insisted to be its proper legal construction. Mr. Cardozo argued that as the Elkins act was passed in 1906 his clients could not be held liable for alleged violations prior to that time, and that there was nothing wrong or illegal for a shipper to seek a lower rate of transportation.

MARKET SAGS FURTHER. Steel, P. R. R. and Hill Stocks Under Heavy Pressure.

The stock market was weak all day yesterday, except for a slight and brief rally on the announcement of the engagement of \$500,000 sold for importation. There was no unfavorable news, except the announcement from Washington late in the afternoon that the \$100,000 special deposits would, after all, be recalled between July 10 and 20.

The sagging tendency of the day quickened into a rapid decline in the last half-hour, and the close was at about the bottom. Pennsylvania and United States Steel preferred were under especial pressure, and Great Northern and Northern Pacific suffered large declines.

CENTRAL CHANGE RUMOR. Story That Newman Will Succeed Depew as Chairman of Board.

The fact that President W. H. Newman of the New York Central Railroad is to sail for a prolonged vacation in Europe has started a rumor abroad, which seemingly meets with credence in railroad circles, that a change is shortly to be made in the management of the road. While President Newman is away the duties of his office are to be performed by First Vice-President C. Brown.

OPPOSITION TO STANDARD OIL. Combination of Rumanian and German Interests Being Organized.

Berlin, June 29.—Another big German petroleum field is being organized under the auspices of the Dresdner Bank and the Scharfhausen Bankverein. The new concern will be the outcome of a consolidation of the Kingdom of Rumania Oil Company, the Morel company and the International Mining Company of Germany, a concern which owns a large interest in the Morel company.

HOSPITAL GIFT TO BRONXVILLE. Real Estate Operator Presents Land to Village—Will Erect Buildings.

W. V. Lawrence, a real estate operator of this city, who lives at No. 939 Fifth avenue, and has a country home at Lawrence Park, at Bronxville, has given to the village of Bronxville two and a half acres of land, on which he will erect three buildings, two of which are to be used for hospital purposes. The whole gift will amount to \$100,000.

REBUKES LAWYERS' DELAYS. Judge Lacombe Sets Limit on Haight & Freese Hearing.

Judge Lacombe rebuked yesterday the dilatory practices that have prevailed in the litigation connection with the failure of the Haight & Freese Co., brokers, a year ago. He signed an order, wherein he says: "The final disposition of this case has been unconscionably delayed. Temporary receivers were appointed more than a year ago, and the taking of proof has not yet begun."
