

THE WORLD'S RECORD OF SIR LYNNEWOOD'S RACE. Equals Halifax's Time of 1:24.4-5 for Seven Furlongs.

Saratoga, N. Y., Aug. 9.—The equalling of the world's record for seven furlongs by Sir Lynnewood and the easy victory of Running Water in the Alabama Stakes of \$5,000 were the features of the racing here today. Sir Lynnewood, with 88 pounds up, beat Inquisitor, Neva Lee and six others in the handicap, first on the card, running the distance in 1:24.4-5.

The usual big crowd was in attendance and the afternoon was the more enjoyable, as a light breeze blew into the grandstand and made the weather conditions less discomforting than in the previous days of the meeting. It was much too warm for full and complete comfort, but the heat was at least bearable and the sport in consequence was the more enjoyed. Four favorites won, and the racing was quite up to the standard in every respect. The only first choice to disappoint was Neva Lee. In the first race and disappoint in the steeplechase.

The winning choices were Flowaway, Running Water, Woolwich and Victoria B. Inquisitor favored Woolwich in the first race, but he went back to 15 to 5 in the face of a strong play on Neva Lee and Sir Lynnewood. Neva Lee had been brought down from Buffalo by A. F. Dayton for a "killing." She had worked a fast trial, and she in the know backed her from a high price of 5 to 1 in places to 3 to 1, and even lower, as the field was at the post. Jesse Lewishohn sent in a big commission, and his lead was followed by some of the other big plungers, who took any price offered and felt it was a good one. She was probably the heaviest played horse of the meeting to date, but failed to justify the confidence of those who wagered on her chances, although Sir Lynnewood had to run in world's record time to beat her. Inquisitor forced the early pace, but Neva Lee raced by him rounding the turn and came into the stretch a length in front. She began to hang in the last sixteenth, as a result of her early efforts, and Sir Lynnewood, which had been cleverly placed back to suit herself and winning the Alabama Stakes with her ears pricked in the fast time of 1:24.5 for one mile and a furlong. Harry Payne Whitney's Brookdale Nymph was easily second, but could never make the winner extend himself. Comedienne followed the distance too far, and Belgravia was always outworn.

The steeplechase furnished a pretty struggle between Allegiance, Ontario and Champs Elysees, which finished as named. Nine horses started, but only three were in the race after the first mile, as Bob Murphy and Glengate bolted, Arabo fell and the others were beaten off Champs Elysees made most of the front, but Allegiance closed fast on the first and won going away, while Mr. Page whipped his

gray gelding Ontario and beat Champs Elysees half a length for the place. Glengate, an imported horse, owned by the Brownleigh Park Stable, was a pronounced favorite for the race at 8 to 5. He got into all kinds of trouble, however, and a grievous disappointment. He almost fell at the fifth jump, but made a remarkable recovery. He knocked down one of the fences and finally bolted at a jump on the backstretch.

Flowaway won the third race after a spirited drive through the last furlong with Big Store and Ben Strong. The two last named took turns at pacemaking, but could not withstand the winner's challenge at the end. Knight of Ivanhoe was played heavily, but he was shut off at the start and by chance he had been ruined.

Neptunus, one of the choices in the fifth race, and well backed by John A. Drake and his friends, practically was left at the post. Woolwich waited for the order and champion to the far turn, when he took command and won in a mild drive from Yorkshire Lad. Freshness was no help to the latter or the decision might have been reversed had the order stopped at the end of six furlongs and finished far back. New Mow Hay was badly handled, and improvement can be looked for when she goes to the post again.

Victoria B. was graded from the main class in the last race. She broke her today and came away easily in the stretch after racing Prince Fortunatus into submission. John Sanford's Rocketstone shows improvement at her first start and ran third, with a steady 2:20 up.

NOTES OF POST AND PADDOCK.

Saratoga, N. Y., Aug. 9.—An agent of the Bureau of Immigration came to Saratoga today and took in custody four English stable boys in the employ of John Higgins, who trains for H. B. Durcan. On the ground that the immigration laws regarding the labor of alien boys violated, Mr. Higgins tried to find a Supreme Court decision to the effect that stay and prevent the boys being taken away, but failed. He explained that he had no contract with the boys, who came to this country looking for employment. They were free to come and go as they pleased, and he understood the action of the immigration authorities.

Frank O'Neil, the ex-jockey, sold Woolwich to W. A. McKinney for \$2,000 just before the fifth race, and the horse won in the name and colors of the latter. He was entered to be sold for \$800, and, when offered at auction, Jack O'Neil bid him up to \$2,000, when McKinney retained him for the usual \$1,000. McKinney, who was second with Yorkshire Lad, profited \$600 by the purchase, while it cost McKinney more than the purse was worth to protect his new purchase.

Inquisitor showed signs of soreness in his shoulder when going to the post in the first race, but he pulled up sound after running to his best form.

QUEEN LEADS FLEET. BANNER DAY FOR GEERS. Veteran Wins Three Races—Rich Stake to Gold Dust Maid.

Buffalo, Aug. 9.—Ed Geers, the veteran driver, had a banner day in the sulky at the third day's meeting of the Grand Circuit at Kenilworth Park, winning three races, including the rich \$10,000 Empire State trot.

The "silent man" captured first money in the blue ribbon event with Gold Dust Maid, favorite at \$100 to the field's \$20. In the first heat of this event Geers was off badly, but gradually improved his position as the race progressed, and, by some clever driving, won the heat at the wire. He captured the second heat easily, but Gold Dust Maid broke in the third heat, which was won by Oro.

Geers also won the 2:16 pace with Ardelle and the 2:09 trot with Lady Gall Hamilton. Both were favorites in the betting, and both won in straight heats.

In the opening race a collision occurred on the first turn, due to Doris B. stepping into the sulky of Daphne Direct. Allen, who drove Doris B., and Walker, who was behind Daphne Direct, were both thrown from the sulks. Walker escaped injury, but Allen sustained three broken ribs and was badly bruised. He was removed to a hospital in an ambulance.

Watson fell in the 2:10 trot, but the horse and his driver, Benyon, escaped injury. The track was fast. The summaries:

LOW LEADS AT GOLF. RETURNS SCORE OF 145. Clever Work in M. G. A. Open Championship at Hollywood.

George Low, of the Baltusrol Golf Club, led the field at the end of the first thirty-six holes of the second annual open championship tournament of the Metropolitan Golf Association on the links of the Hollywood Golf Club yesterday. His score of 65, four strokes better than his next nearest opponent, Isaac Mackie, of Fox Hills, and Jack Hutchinson, of St. Andrews, Robert Peebles, of Tuckahoe, came next with 150, a stroke better than Herbert Strong, of Apawamis, Alec Smith, of Nassau, the national Metropolitan Golf Association and Western open champion, finishing sixth with 152.

Included in a collection of five at 185 was Jerome D. Travers, of Montclair, the amateur title holder of the association. Two other prominent amateurs in the field were Walter J. Travis, of Garden City, and Gilman P. Tiffany, of this city. The latter did creditably, with 155, but Mr. Travis, who is far from being a well man, could not do better than 161.

There were thirty-five starters, including eight amateurs, but with the exception of the two mentioned they did not do well. Paul Wilcox, chairman of the Metropolitan Golf Association, tournament committee, started the players. Leighton Calkins, secretary of the association, also was on the list. The committee members present included J. J. O'Donohue, jr., chairman; J. J. McAllehan, Frank E. Henderson and H. Content.

There was a special \$50 prize for the best eighteen-hole score in the morning, which was divided by Low and Mackie, both of whom did 70. Hutchinson won the \$25 in the afternoon with a 73, while the best thirty-six hole score of the day went to Low.

The latter had John M. Ward, the Fox Hills amateur, for a partner in the pair made a good combination. Low drove a long ball, generally in the middle of the fairway, and made few mistakes with his iron. On the greens he surprised his partner with an exhibition of deadly putting that would have done credit to Travis when the latter was at his best. Low has been reported as being an indifferent putter.

Smith and Travis played together, and they carried a gallery throughout the day. Smith drove well, but he was not so accurate with his iron. The champion, usually a deadly putter, also had lapses on the greens, which proved costly. One of his efforts at the final round was the thirty-two hole in the morning, where a beautiful second left his ball within twenty feet of the pin. He then sank it.

He surprised the gallery by getting bunkered going to the eighth in the afternoon, and again four holes later. He was not so accurate with his iron, and he was overworked, and announced his intention to withdraw from the tournament.

Travers and Martin O'Loughlin, the Plainfield "pro," attracted considerable attention; the former because he is regarded by many as the representative amateur of the East, and O'Loughlin because he enjoys a similar position among the home-bred professionals.
