

MRS. VERRAULT MISSING

Husband She Declared Dead, Tells of Her History.

Another warrant was issued yesterday for Mrs. George T. Verrault, alias "Mrs. Helen Hamilton," now out of jail, following a complaint of James B. MacClellan, a Philadelphia grocer, who charged that she swindled him out of \$800 when, as he supposed, he was engaged to marry her.

Later it was rumored about town that the woman had jumped her bail. She is out of the city, but her lawyer, Hugh Gordon Miller, gave out a statement that she would have her at Marshall Henkel's office at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The biggest card in the prosecution turned up yesterday in the person of George T. Verrault, a newspaper artist, who lives at No. 1914 Benson avenue, Bensonhurst.

An elderly woman called last yesterday afternoon at Marshall Henkel's office and said she believed Mrs. Verrault was the woman who ordered a \$500 dress from her and then refused to take it.

Verrault corroborated everything a friend of his said yesterday about the woman.

"So far as we know," she was born Bina Finnegan, in Ironton, Wis. As a girl she was taken by a man named George T. Morse, of Schuylkill, in whose family she was reared and acted as a nurse.

"One week after she was married to Verrault in Philadelphia she was arrested for shoplifting. She got her out, and time and time again the same thing happened.

"Verrault met her in Philadelphia, where she was known as Bina Verrault, and they were married. She was a stenographer for the Delaware Fire Insurance Company. Three months after Verrault was married to her she was arrested for shoplifting.

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JUSTICE IN COURT

Fitzgerald Submits to Examination in Supplementary Proceedings.

Justice Thomas W. Fitzgerald appeared before Justice Dickey, in the Supreme Court, in Brooklyn, yesterday morning and submitted to an examination in supplementary proceedings. George B. Fountain, the attorney who obtained a judgment against the justice, retired with him to a private room and conducted the examination. He would not disclose the nature of Justice Fitzgerald's testimony.

Justice Fitzgerald's appearance in court yesterday was in compliance with an order by Justice Dickey directing him to submit to the examination or be punished for contempt. Justice Fitzgerald said the whole thing was due to a misunderstanding, and that he had not intended to show any contempt for the court.

As Justice Fitzgerald was leaving the courthouse he was served with papers from the office of the Corporation Counsel ordering him to pay \$75 taxes on his place at Port Richmond, Staten Island. The justice is at present sitting in the Children's court, because of his delay in getting there. The court was adjourned until 2 o'clock. Justice Fitzgerald said the testimony was secret and that he could make no statement.

WEB OF CRIME TIGHTENS

Several New Informations Against Accused Trust Company Men.

[By Telegram to The Tribune.] Pittsburgh, Aug. 13.—Six new informations charging embezzlement and six charging conspiracy to defraud were filed today against Clarence S. Hixton, the defaulting bookkeeper of the Union Trust Company. One information for embezzlement and six for conspiracy were also lodged against Clifford B. Wray, the teller arrested last week in Toronto, Canada.

Hixton's bail was increased to \$100,000 and Wray's to \$100,000. The informations were made today by W. H. Gifford, treasurer of the trust company. The young men are charged with stealing \$125,000 of the bank's funds, but bankers here say the loss will probably run much more than that and may reach \$200,000. With a surplus of over \$2,000,000, the larger figure would not affect the bank at all. But the action today indicates that the bank officials purpose to punish the wrongdoers to the limit.
