NO MEXICAN REVOLT. Colonel W. C. Greene Discredits Reports of Insurrection.

Colonel William C. Greene, president of the Greene Consolidated Copper Company, said yesterday that all the reports of a revolutionary movement in Mexico, intended to develop into a genuine armed insurrection, were false.

In the last few days Colonel Greene has been sought eagerly by many railroad men and some with banking interests, who desired his opinion on the situation in Mexico. This he gave yesterday, as follows:

All such reports are absolutely void of truth. I have daily telegraphic information from El Paso, Douglas, Bisbee and Ganana, from which it appears that certain persons there, from interested motives, have been sending up reports about the boundary line, large movement of troops to Agua Prieta, etc., etc., from the custom house at Nogales, and so on.

This man Magoon at one time published in St. Louis a revolutionary sheet known as "The Regeneration," which had a limited circulation among Mexicans, and had for its object the overthrow of the Diaz government. Last year a suit for criminal libel was brought against the paper, and Magoon fled to Canada to avoid prosecution.

LARGEST DEFICIT IN YEARS. Heavy Gold Imports Are Expected To Be Announced To-Morrow.

While almost all last week a poor bank statement had been expected, the showing of a reserve deficit yesterday of \$6,399,925 beguared the most pessimistic predictions which had been made. The deficit reported was the largest in many years. It was the first below the legal 25 per cent requirement since the week ending December 3, 1900.

TAKES MEASURE OF DEPOSITORS. Method Like Bertillon System to Prevent Fraud at Night and Day Bank.

The Night and Day Bank, at Fifth avenue and 45th street, has begun a scheme which, it is intended, will do away, to a large extent, with the possibility of bogus customers getting money. This is a system of identification somewhat similar to the Bertillon method.
