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ARMY AND NAVY NEWS.

Washington, October 4. GENERAL STAFF EFFICIENT.—The transfer of nearly six thousand troops from various points in this country, as far away as the Pacific Coast in the case of the two mountain batteries of artillery, for the first Cuban expedition, has demonstrated the effectiveness of the army General Staff system on its first practical trial.


CONTRIBUTIONS.—A box of gifts has been received from Miss A. E. Bingham, who has spent the summer at Asbury Park.



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
