

CUP CARS WEIGHED IN. KEENE WILL NOT START.

Final Plans for the Vanderbilt Cup Race To-day. The final preparations for the Vanderbilt Cup race over the 29.71 miles circuit on Long Island to-day were completed last night. The most important incident yesterday was the weighing in of the cars at Garden City.

A drizzling rain was falling when George Heath drove up, shortly before 10 o'clock, but the sun came out later. Jenatzy and Duray were the only ones who had any trouble in making the required weight of 2,204 pounds or under.

The three Fiat cars, to be driven by Lancia, Nazarro and Dr. Welschott, were all under weight, as were also the two Itala machines, which Cagno and Fabry will pilot in the race.

"Joe" Tracy came in for a rousing reception when he made his appearance with his Locomobile. The winner of the elimination trials made the weigh-in easily. A. L. Riker, the designer of the car, said that the Locomobile would use detachable rims in the race.

The Hotchkiss car of Elliott F. Shepard appeared at the weighing stand with a huge exhaust which had been used in practice. This caused the machine to be slightly over weight.




The feature of the day in the absence of any fixture, was ruined by scratches, so that Handarra had a practical walkover, with only Lancelotti to beat.
