

POLISH REBELS SHOT.

Attempt to Wreck Train—Patrol Attacked—Ten Executions.

Warsaw, Oct. 5.—Terrorists to-day murdered a road overseer near the station at Macloewice, on the Viattula Railroad, and then removed the rails from in front of an approaching mail train. A gadman flagged the train and averted an accident.

A military patrol which was conducting two revolutionists to jail to-day was attacked in a narrow street. The soldiers promptly killed both prisoners.

In another encounter in Marshalkoff street this afternoon soldiers killed two revolutionists who had attacked and killed a policeman.

The ten terrorists condemned to death at Czenstokowa yesterday were hanged there to-day.

TRIALS STIR CAPITAL.

St. Petersburg Workmen Angry Over Treason Cases. St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—Agitation by the workmen of St. Petersburg, who for some time have been tranquil, has again begun. There were several largely attended demonstrations in various industrial quarters of the city to-night and last night, on account of the trial of fifty-one members of the Council of Workmen's Delegates, a revolutionary organization, which operated in the troublous times of last October and November. These men have been confined for ten months, and their trial began to-day. They are charged with high treason, the specifications of the charges being the preparation of armed uprisings to overthrow the government. Troops occupied the courthouse where the trial was held, and the street outside was patrolled by Cossacks.

Of three successive presidents of the council, Krustaleff said that he was a lawyer, Bernstein that he was a writer, and the third president, Knudianski, admitted that he was a professional revolutionist. Other members of the council are physicians, engineers, teachers and students, the last named including three women. The trial will be long.

The national committee of the Octoberist League, which is in session at Moscow to draft a programme for submission to the coming convention, is attempting to issue a narrow and definite course between approval of Premier Stolypin's policy and the liberalization necessary to win popular support. The league adopts a policy of benevolent non-interference, in order to give the administration a chance to put its promised reforms into effect.

ESSIPFF FLEES TO MARSEILLES.

Paris, Oct. 5.—Gabriel Essipoff, the fugitive Russian bentonist who arrived here yesterday from New York by way of Havre, accompanied by the wife of General Ouchakov, finding that their presence in Paris was causing the capital hurriedly to see them off to Marseilles.

STEAMER STRIKES SHOAL.

The Bermudian Stuck on Mud in Harbor—Passengers Taken Off.

The steamer Bermudian, the latest addition to the Quebec line, which has only been in service a little over a year, ran into the Red Hook harbor on the 29th street, Brooklyn, yesterday as it was coming up from quarantine.

A slight mist hung over the Lower Bay while the Bermudian was coming up, but points along the harbor were visible for five hundred yards. The Bermudian docks at Christopher street, North River, and the pilot who was bringing her into the harbor would not explain why he was so far from the outward of his course.

The Red Hook shoals is a bad place for a steamer to ground. The Graf Waldersee, of the Hamburg-American Line, was stuck fast in the same place by three days.

In the case of the 160 passengers aboard when she struck, there was a fairly high tide at the time, but the efforts of eight tugboats failed to release the passengers, who were brought ashore in the tugboats when the tide began to ebb.

An effort was made last night, with four tugboats, to tow the steamer off, but the tugboats were unable to do so. A large fleet of tugboats will tug at her again this morning.

The tugboats brought the Bermudian from England to this port on her maiden voyage more than a year ago.

ADDITIONAL ST. PAUL R. R. STOCK.

Directors Authorized to Issue \$75,000,000 of Each Common and Preferred.

Stockholders of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company, according to special dispatch from Chicago, received yesterday in Wall Street the report of the annual meeting of the company, which was held in Chicago on Saturday, and adopted a resolution authorizing the directors to issue \$75,000,000 additional common stock and \$75,000,000 additional preferred.

The association declared that it had been made at a stockholders' meeting, which was held at 10 o'clock on Saturday at the street, and that the directors had been authorized to issue the additional stock.
