HEARST PAYS RESPECTS.

Candidate Also Favors Brooklyn with Slaps at Elections Board.

William R. Hearst made a tour in Kings and Queens counties last night, speaking at six meetings in Brooklyn and one in Long Island City. At only one of these did the candidate for Governor receive what might be termed a demonstrative reception. This was at Broadway and Chaumont street, in a tent. The other meetings were comparatively mild affairs. The first of these was at Frong's Park, Long Island City, where the candidate spoke to about one thousand.

HEARST COIN IN POOLS

Estate Allied with Financiers He Reviled, Is Charged.

That the Hearst estate, "of which W. R. Hearst the direct beneficiary and the ultimate owner," had for years participated in public franchise pools and syndicates in this city was declared in a long and circumstantial article published yesterday in "The New York Herald," with the additional assertion that the estate had had close financial relations with "the men who are now being reviled by Hearst and denounced as thieves and robbers by the nominee and his newspapers."

The policy of the Hearst newspapers, it is charged, has been to maintain silence concerning syndicate deals in which the estate was interested until after it had sold out at high prices, whereupon the papers would discover that these syndicate operations were outrages upon the public. It is also alleged that in 1886, when the Hearst papers were zealously advocating the election of W. J. Bryan to the Presidency, "the Hearst estate, which had supplied the funds for the establishment of the Hearst newspapers, was engaged in buying sterling bills in London, so as to convert all its available cash into gold in case Bryan was elected;" and that in that campaign, when the financial resources of the country were being strained to a breaking point, the Hearst estate was a large and persistent seller of United States bonds.

Referring to the syndicates with which the Hearst estate is alleged to have been identified, "The Herald" says, in part: "The more recent operations of the Hearst estate in Wall Street in getting in the bad company which the nominee condemns, it is said, include perhaps ten or twelve of the more important syndicates."

Those that were particularly mentioned yesterday were the Metropolitan Traction Company, in which the estate was for a long time a heavy stockholder, the stock of which was sold by the estate at the top notch of about 200; the Tobacco Trust, which was formed by the same Thomas F. Ryan who now rides in the sightseeing automobile of the "Thunderbolt" cartoons; the Kuhn-Loeb syndicate, which was formed just after the Third Avenue Railroad Company was wrecked, which was an exceedingly profitable venture, and the Lexington Avenue syndicate, which was created for the extension of the Metropolitan Street Railway lines from 23d street to Harlem.

These syndicates were all formed to make money. They were created to develop new systems of traction on enormous capitalization, which has resulted in keeping down facilities in the way of additional cars in order that dividends can be paid on the stock and interest on the bonds. In this way the Hearst estate profited to the extent of millions of dollars, while the Hearst newspapers were busy on the subject of traction outrages in the city of New York. It is pointed out as an illustration that not a word was said in connection with the great fight of the property owners and residents of the West Side against the Metropolitan Street Railway Company.

Facts obtained by "The Herald" Friday show that Hearst as the secretary of the syndicate transactions in Wall Street, in underwritings and in deals which had for their purpose the sale of the stock of the company at higher prices, and in the creation of trusts which he now attacks.

Not only were Hearst and his father's estate in the famous syndicate which sold bonds on the Third Avenue after that property was wrecked, but it was definitely learned that the Hearst estate participated in the deal which resulted in the formation of the great tobacco trust, the Continental Tobacco Company, which was formed by Whitney and Ryan, Hearst's estate participated in the underwriting of that Continental Tobacco Company which is now a State government controlled enterprise.

It was learned that the Hearst estate participated in numerous other syndicates formed in the development of the Metropolitan traction line, the infusion of capital into the same has resulted in curbing the street facilities to the public. It is logically pointed out that every dollar of profit taken by the Hearst estate in these syndicates has been used to increase the charges on the present traction properties.

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Then the speaker paid his respects to the Board of Elections, saying: "The Board of Elections is composed of discredited politicians who last year helped the fraud Mayor to steal the election. One of them has seventeen service stripes in the shape of individual medals for various offenses."

Albion, N. Y., Oct. 27 (Special).—Orleans County Democrats by the score, under the leadership of Senator W. W. Burdick, and the party have learned to trust by years of experience, are denouncing Charles E. Hughes and against William R. Hearst. It is a most conservative estimate to say that at least one hundred Democrats in Albion and at least half that number in Medina alone will vote for Mr. Hughes. Most of those who have thus declared themselves do not consider that they are forfeiting any of their party regularity in voting against Hearst. They say daily that Hearst has shown himself not to be a Democrat, and they feel under no party obligations to support him. On the contrary, they are agreed that it is their duty to their party to aid in defeating Hearst.
