

BRILLIANT TURF DUEL.

A NOD DECIDES RACE.

Running Water Beats Frank Gill for the Edgemere Stakes.

The making of two track records and the brilliant performance of Veil, Running Water and Frank Gill were incidents at the Aqueduct race track yesterday which aroused the good sized crowd to a show of enthusiasm that made it plain that the sport on these closing days of a long season was thoroughly enjoyed.

Running Water and Frank Gill fought out a duel through the last quarter of a mile of the Edgemere Stakes, which was only decided by the action of a nod as the judges were passed. This race alone was well worth the journey to the track.

Running Water made a new track record, as the old mark of 1:52 3-5 was made by Dolly Spanker two years ago. Philander opened a fight for the race, which was for all ages at weight for age, but even while strongly supported he went back in the betting in the face of a plunge on Running Water, which forced her to give down from 2 to 1 to 6 to 1.

Veil, the two-year-old daughter of Disgraceful, confirmed the good impression she made when she won her first start a few days ago by winning the Beldame Handicap for two-year-olds filled in easy fashion and in the fast time of 59 seconds.

W. Gould Brockway's Expansionist won the Queensboro Steeplechase after a spirited drive through the stretch with Yama Christy. They were about equal favorites in the betting, although the former closed the actual choice.

Death of Sewell, the Jockey, Explored by Racing Folk.

The colt performed well enough at Belmont Park to indicate that he was above the ordinary, but his race on Friday was distressingly bad. His new owners will start him in the Grand Conception Stakes at Benning and then ship him to Canada, where he will do most of his racing next year.

The sad and untimely death of Sewell, the jockey, as told in the late editions of yesterday's Tribune, was the chief subject of conversation at Aqueduct yesterday. He was only eighteen years old, but had earned a forward place among the best jockeys in the country. C. E. Rowe brought Sewell East two years ago, and it did not take long for him to prove his ability in the saddle.
