CENTRAL FOUND GUILTY GAVE \$26,000 IN REBATES. Railroad May Have to Pay \$20,000 in Fines.

The New York Central Railroad was convicted yesterday on the charge of issuing rebates to the American Sugar Refining Company to the amount of \$26,000, the jury returning a verdict of guilty, after being out two hours.

The highest penalty that can be inflicted is a fine of \$20,000. The company received until November 20 to make a motion for an arrest of judgment. This is the second time that the road has been convicted of giving rebates.

The case was tried before Judge Holt, in the Criminal Branch of the United States Circuit Court. There was only one count in this indictment. In the previous indictment there were several counts, and the New York Central was fined \$108,000.

The courtroom was crowded yesterday morning when the case was called, as it was known that Joseph H. Choate would argue on the relation of the Elkins law to the case.

BROKER OFF CHANGE.

Edwin F. Raynor Suspended for Four Years—Old Offence.

The suspension of Edwin F. Raynor for four years from the New York Stock Exchange for violation of the "commission law" was announced yesterday morning from the rostrum of the Exchange by President Pomroy. This suspension was voted by the governing committee at its regular meeting on Wednesday afternoon.

The penalty for the first offence of this sort is a member is suspended for one to five years, and for the second offence expulsion. The maximum penalty has been very rarely inflicted. The most recent case being that of I. B. Newcomb, who in May, 1904, was suspended for five years. The punishment given Mr. Raynor was declared yesterday by many of his friends to have been unduly severe, owing to the peculiar circumstances attending his case.

According to several members of the Exchange, Mr. Raynor's offence was committed six years ago, and the man with whom he exchanged his commissions—the "unpardonable sin" split the Stock Exchange—has been levying blackmail on him ever since through threats to inform the Exchange authorities of the violation.

Another version, also from good sources, had it that the disclosure to the governing committee that the disclosure by the former customer on failure to receive from Mr. Raynor the sum demanded.

Mr. Raynor was formerly head of the Stock Exchange firm of E. F. Raynor & Co., which Exchange firm for the last two or three years failed in 1900. For the last two or three years he has had headquarters at the office of H. M. Hume & Co., No. 18 Wall street, and has been doing a "brokerly business." He has been a member of the Stock Exchange since April 2, 1896.
