Denver, Nov. 24.—The officials of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific, the Moffatt road, say that a tunnel boring machine is being constructed in Denver, which, if it accomplishes the results promised by the inventor, will bore a tunnel through the main range at the foot of James Peak, three miles long, in eighty-eight days.

ARREDONDO TO STAND TRIAL.

Leader of Mexican Revolutionists Offers to Surrender to Enemies.

Galveston, Nov. 24.—Juan Jose Arredondo, the returned leader of the revolutionists, has decided to return voluntarily to Mexico and stand trial. The Mexican government has assured him that he will have every opportunity to prove his innocence, and that a reasonable leniency will be extended him.

WASHINGTON BANK TO PAY IN FULL.

Washington, Nov. 24.—The Controller of the Currency to-day announced that the receiver of the People's Savings Bank, of this city, which was closed by the Controller on October 24 last, had placed in possession of sufficient funds to pay all depositors and other creditors in full.

LATIN-AMERICAN TOPICS.
