

CHIEF MURPHY RETIRES

Jersey City's Veteran Police Head Allowed to Quit Honorably.

Chief of Police Murphy of Jersey City retired last night under the pension act on half pay after the Police Board, which had convened for a special session for the purpose, had formally withdrawn the charges that had been lodged against him and had revoked the suspension.

Then, addressing Mr. Vredenberg, who represented Chief Murphy, the Corporation Counsel asked: "Now, under these conditions, can you state what the Chief's position is in this matter?"

The Rev. Charles S. Quinn, formerly attached to St. Agnes' Catholic Church at Atlantic Highlands, N. J., a priest of the diocese of Trenton, was found dead yesterday in a furnished room and boarding house, No. 228 East 18th street.
