

POLICE GRILL WOMAN IN JERSEY MURDER CASE.

Victim Said by Her To Be Agnes Young, Who Is Being Traced.

The authorities of Hudson County, N. J., have not been able to solve the mystery of the woman whose body was found Thursday in a swamp at Harrison. Mrs. Hattie Hull said positively yesterday that the body was that of Mrs. Agnes Young.

Mrs. Hull, who is an expert bookkeeper and stenographer, said that she was acquainted with Mrs. Young and of their trips together in New York and Jersey City.

Mrs. Hull was subjected to a severe cross-examination yesterday, but the authorities failed to shake her story. She was for four hours under the "third degree" examination last night, but she stuck to her story and never contradicted herself.

DENY OVERORGANIZING.

Robert W. de Forest Replies to Charity Organization Society Critic.

The Tribune received the following letter regarding the annual report of the Charity Organization Society, which it did not deem proper to publish until it had been referred to the officers of the society:

Sir: I wish to call to your attention the report of the Charity Organization Society for the year ended September 30, 1907, showing the great expense of distributing a comparatively small amount of relief. The figures given below are taken from their report, and, I think, are sufficiently impressive to need no comment.

Does it not seem to you that the Charity Organization Society is somewhat over-organized?

At the Charity Organization Society Robert W. de Forest, its president, yesterday denied these allegations. He said that the society had a large number of workers who had printed the original charges of "over-organization." Mr. de Forest's statement follows:

A letter in your issue of to-day repeats the thoughtless criticism that has been so frequently made of the work of charity organizations, and that they expend more for "administration" than for relief. It gives the opportunity, however, of replying to the charge which is a criticism based entirely upon a misconception of the work and functions of charity organizations in general.
