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
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THE KAISER'S CURIOUS WARHORSES.

A STRIKING MONUMENT IN MEMORY OF GENERAL CIALDINI, OF ITALY.

This group, commemorative of General Enrico Cialdini, which is to be erected at Castelfidardo, where he won his signal victory over the Papal troops in 1860, is the work of Professor Vito Pardo, of Rome, and shows Cialdini leading the attack on the last bulwark of the enemy at Castelfidardo. Cialdini was born at Castelvetro, in Modena, in 1811. As a lad of twenty he took part in the rising in Modena against the hated yoke of Austria. His enthusiasm forced him into exile, and he betook himself to Paris, where he became in turn a chemist, a doctor and man of letters. On his return to Italy in 1848 he was given command of a regiment at the battle of Novara. He next entered the service of the King of Sardinia, and in 1855 he commanded the Sardinian contingent of the allied forces in the Crimea, where he won a European reputation. In the Franco-Italian War of 1859 he organized the Alpine brigade. In the following year he won his spurs against the Papal troops, defeating them (11,000 strong), under General Lamoriciere, in the battle of Castelfidardo, September 18, 1860. In honor of this exploit Cialdini was created Duke of Gaeta in 1864. He was ambassador to the French Republic, 1876-'81, and died at Leghorn on September 8, 1892.

JUVENILE AMBITION.
