

CHOICES BOWLED OVER

"GOOD THINGS" ALSO LOSE
Dandelion Beats Nealon and Others in the Handicap.

By the time the last race was run at Belmont Park yesterday the form players were all at sea. Surprises were again in order, and favorites were bowled over with a consistency that made it appear as if the tide would never turn.

Dandelion, which won the Saratoga Handicap last year, after being so unfortunate as to lose three of the big spring handicaps by a short head, is likely to play an important part again this year, judging by his victory yesterday.

Frank Gill, which earned quite a reputation late in the fall last year, made his first appearance as a three-year-old in this race. He had some following around 10 to 1, and was backed down a couple of points, but no opportunity was offered to judge of what kind of a horse he may be this year, as he would not break when the barrier was released, and was left at the post.

Harry Payne Whitney's Tanya, which won the Belmont Stakes two years ago, and has come back to the races after a year's retirement, was soundly beaten in the first race yesterday, for which she was a strong favorite at even money.

Marbles, the favorite in the second race for two-year-olds, bolted as the barrier went up and crashed into the outside fence, throwing Garner, who had the mount, heavily. The filly ran away a mile and a half before she was caught.

Charles Lane Poor's sloop yacht Westmore went into commission on June 1. Mr. Poor intends to do some cruising in July, after several races on the Sound.

BOISE TRIAL ON AGAIN.
DIFFICULT TO GET JURY.

Boise, Idaho, May 13.—Little progress was made to-day in selecting a jury to try William D. Haywood, secretary and treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, for alleged complicity in the murder of former Governor Steunenberg.

The bulk of the jurors are expected to come from this venire, largely made up of farmers from the country surrounding Boise. The venire showed seventy-five farmers or ranchmen, the remainder being business men.

No. 1, A. L. Ewing, carpenter; No. 2, W. M. Van Orsdale, grocer; No. 3, Samuel D. Gilman, farmer; No. 4, J. L. Wagoner, farmer; No. 5, George Walker, butcher; No. 6, George H. McIntyre, farmer; No. 7, W. N. Rudge, farmer; No. 8, Ora Cole, miner; No. 9, W. W. Wisby, real estate; No. 10, Samuel A. Wingate, irrigation engineer; No. 11, Samuel F. Russell, farmer.

There is growing impatience among those who came here to attend the trial to hear the opening address of the prosecution, which probably will be delivered by James H. Hawley, leading counsel for the prosecution.

It is certain that no testimony tending to lay the broad foundation for the alleged conspiracy of which Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone are said to have been a part will be introduced without a stubborn and prolonged fight by the defense.

Julian P. Steunenberg, the twenty-one-year-old son of former Governor Steunenberg, was in the courtroom this afternoon when the trial proceedings were resumed.

Haywood was brought in while the clerk was reading the minutes of last Thursday's session. The reading of the minutes and court record are a part of each day's routine under the procedure of this state.

There was but one absent when the roll of veniremen was called. Judge Wood directed that an attachment be issued against the missing juror. A moment later the judge read the law fixing the power of the court to excuse jurors.

"If any proposed juror has a legal excuse to offer he will now step forward," said Judge Wood. Immediately there was an uproar in the courtroom.

Judge Wood excused twenty-four of those who were heard. The offering of excuses occupied one hour and twenty minutes. Three of the excused veniremen presented doctor's certificates; four were excused on personal pleas of illness; three because they were overseers of the county roads; five because of the illness of their wives; one, seventy-six years old, because of age; two for pressing business reasons; two irrigation ditch riders; one chairman of the City Board of Public Works; one probation officer; one witness; and one substitute rural free delivery mail carrier.

At 3:25 o'clock p. m. when the eleven men who had been locked up since Thursday were brought into the courtroom, Ellsworth Lester, a farmer, was called into vacant seat No. 4 and examined first by the attorneys for the state. Lester said he had feared and expressed an unqualified opinion and was challenged for cause by the state. He was excused.

Walter Shaw, a young farmer who came to Idaho two years ago from the State of Washington, was called to seat No. 4, and successfully passed the examination of the state and attorney for the defense. He had not formed an opinion, had no prejudice or bias against or for the prisoner and had no prejudice against circumstantial evidence. He was closely questioned by the attorneys for the defense.

A project for an automobile highway running over private lands from Boston to New York, is before the Massachusetts Legislature. The estimated cost is \$70,000,000, the length of the proposed automobile road is 172 miles and the total cost of construction will be between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.

Blackwell's Island Approach Bids. It will cost at least \$1,576,760 to build the Manhattan approach of the new Blackwell's Island Bridge. That sum was the lowest bid for constructing the steel and masonry approach to the bridge when bids were opened yesterday.
