NOTASULGA'S GOODRACE

BEATS COHORT IN DAISY. Tony Faust Wins Coney Island Handicap in Sensational Finish.

After the rush and bustle of Suburban Day it seemed quiet and almost lonesome at Sheepshead Bay yesterday. A good sized crowd was in attendance, however, and enjoyed the seven races on the programme with some degree of interest, even though the winners were hard to find. Notasulga won the Daisy Stakes for two-year-olds and Tony Faust the Coney Island Handicap for three-year-olds and over, in which most of the best sprinters training went to the post. Miller rode one winner, his first in two days, which brought some consolation to his many followers.

Notasulga beat Cohort in the Daisy Stakes at two furlongs on the turf and once more proved herself one of the best and most consistent two-year-olds in training. This is the more remarkable inasmuch as she was campaigned at New Orleans before coming to New York. Cohort has been generally ranked as second only to Colin as the best two-year-old developed this year, on his comparatively easy victory in the Great American Stakes at Gravesend. He was only conceding one pound to Notasulga yesterday, according to the scale, and the Commoner felly beat him rather cleverly, after racing James B. GOLF TITLE FOR ROSS.

NICHOLLS IS SECOND. Travers Leads the Amateurs in Open Championship Tourney.

Philadelphia, June 21.—Alec Ross, of Brae Burn, for the last two years open champion of the Massachusetts State Golf Association, won the national open golf title to-day, when he finished with a score of 202 for seventy-two holes over the links of the Philadelphia Cricket Club. This was two strokes better than the score made by Gilbert Nicholls, of Woodland, who earned second place. Alexander Campbell, of Brooklyn, finished third with 203.

Jack Hobens, of Englewood, made fourth place with 205, but there was a triple tie at 210 between George Low, of Baitur; Peter Robertson, of Pittsburg; and Fred McLeod, of Chicago. David Brown, of Boston, and Nicholas, who had 211 strokes, and then came Donald Ross, of Oakley, with 212. These ten players received the following money prize:

First, \$1,000; second, \$500; A. Campbell, third, \$300; Hobens, fourth, \$200; Low, Robertson and McLeod divided fifth, sixth and seventh money, each getting \$100; Brown and Ben Nichols divided eighth and ninth money, each getting \$50, and Donald Ross, tenth, \$20.
