FRIZETTE WINS EASILY TAKES THE TROY STAKES. Miller Rides Three Winners—Four Favorites Lose.

Saratoga, N. Y., Aug. 16.—Frizette, the comely daughter of Hamburg-Oudouze, won the Troy Stakes here to-day and added \$1,500 to the big winning total of James R. Keene. She raced well to the post, but drifted back in the absence of any material support, to 4 to 1. Master Robert was the favorite, but was slow to settle in his stride, and had little or no chance after the first quarter. He showed a flash of speed on the turn and ran up into fourth place only to drop out of it again.

Miller and Port Johnson were the only winning favorites. Gallivant won the handicap at one mile and a quarter in a common gallop, beating Martin Doyle and Cork Hill, the only other starters.

When Nealon was scratched Martin Doyle opened a good race, but he drifted back to the face of a big plunge on Gallivant. Cork Hill was the outsider. E. Dugan broke Gallivant off in front and kept him there to the end except for a few strides on the backstretch, when Martin Doyle and Cork Hill both headed him. When Dugan was ready Gallivant came right away.

Nineteen two-year-olds went to the post in the last race and John Sanford's Fort Johnson getting a lucky break, was graduated from the maiden class. Dennis Stafford, C. J. Cella and Alchemy were all heavily played, but to no avail, as none of them finished in the money. Dennis Stafford was practically backed off the boards as the horses were on the way to the post, and 2 to 1 was hard to get. He was badly interfered with on the far turn, which put an end to one of John E. Madden's carefully planned "killings."

But Masterson won the handicap at six furlongs, in the fast time of 1:11.4, which equaled the track record, made by De Munt a few days ago. Jack Atkin, the favorite, showed the way to the stretch, but Masterson won him down in the last sixteenth and won going away.

Anneta, Lady, Jersey Lady and Lady Vincent attracted the play in the second race, but Killcrankie, at 25 to 1, made every post a winning one. Green Seal showed improvement over her last race and won the fifth event at 8 to 1. Fancy Bird, the favorite, stopped in the stretch, and Arimo, closing resolutely, earned the place.

WESTERN CHAMPIONSHIP GERMANIANS HOLD THE CUP EASTERN PAIR BEATEN. Hackett and Alexander Find Clothier and Larned Easy on Crescent Courts.

The first match for the lawn tennis doubles championship of the United States was played yesterday on the grounds of the Crescent Athletic Club, Philadelphia. Hackett and Alexander, the victors of the Western title, defeated William J. Clothier and William A. Larned, the well known champions, 6-3, 6-0, 6-1. The score shows how easy was the progress of Hackett and Alexander, and it presages an equally easy victory for them to-day, when, on the same courts, they are to meet Bryan M. Grant and Nat Thourmond, the Southern champions, in the final match of this year will be the blame or praise can be placed anywhere in particular. It may be said that Larned's weakness is to be sure, it has been said often that Larned and Clothier do not double players by nature, but they have played doubles together a great deal, and they have by degrees become accustomed to each other's style of play.

Only in the third set was there a relieving stretch in which the match became something like real lawn tennis. Then Clothier and Larned fought their way up from a score of 2-2 against them, making it eventually 4-4. In just before the match, the partner of the first set, he did better work than his partner in this stage. He earned four out of eight points in bringing up the score to even terms and played much like the Larned of old. He soon faded away, however, and eventually the match was even, lost a set on his own service at love.

In the match Hackett and Alexander scored 91 points to 55 for their rivals. Of the 91 points made by Hackett and Alexander, Hackett contributed 70 on his service. Larned contributed 41 points on error, including two double faults, and Clothier made 20 mistakes. Larned and Clothier, in gaining their points, were the first to lose a set in the final set. Hackett made 14 mistakes and Alexander 22 to swell the total of their rivals. Hackett was the only player to get through the third set without driving a ball into the net.

There was a wind which blew three-quarters across the court behind the players, and preceding the match the wind started blowing, and Hackett and Alexander had driven the ball out of court twice, four successive errors by Hackett and Alexander gave the Eastern champions the game. A smash by Clothier and a serve by Alexander gave the Western team the lead, but with the score at 4-15, the Western title holders broke through and earned a deuce game, which Hackett carried off by a pretty placing shot.

Three errors and a good serve by Alexander carried off the second set. The score was tied at 2-2, Hackett and Alexander bringing it up to deuce after Clothier had hit 40 love on his service. Every point Clothier and Larned got was an error. Their opponents, Hackett and Alexander, were well placed in the third set, and they won the fifth game. An out by Clothier, a pretty place by Hackett, a double fault by Larned and a beautiful cross-court drive by Hackett made the score in games 2-1.
