

"FINGEY" IS CONFIDENT NO FEAR OF M'CARREN.

Believes Judgeships Will Go to Democrats—Reticent on Fusion.

William J. Conners, chairman of the Democratic State Committee, was in conference yesterday at Tammany Hall with Charles F. Murphy over the question of calling the state committee together and naming candidates for the Court of Appeals bench.

"I don't know of any fusion at this time, but you never can tell what will happen." "Have you talked with Mr. Hearst about it?" "No," said Mr. Conners, "I haven't seen Mr. Hearst. I see that some of the papers are talking about the nomination of Attorney General Jackson. I don't think there is the slightest probability that Mr. Jackson will be nominated."

"Senator McCarren says to-day that the committee probably will nominate the Bartletts, and intimates that he is going to beat you in the state committee," it was suggested. "He can't beat anything," said Mr. Conners, stoutly. "We are not afraid of anything that he can do."

"What about your opponents? Who will they name for the presidency?" "Well, it will either be President Roosevelt or some one else. Roosevelt is in control and will dictate the nomination. But it makes no difference who they put up. We will name a candidate next year who will beat him."


When Mr. Conners was asked if it would be Bryan or Hearst he shook his head good-naturedly without answering. When Charles F. Murphy was seen at Tammany Hall yesterday he said: "I haven't anything to say about the judges. Nothing has been done yet."

"Is Daniel B. Lucey, the Ogdensburg lawyer, a candidate?" "Oh, yes," said Mr. Murphy, chuckling; "he is a candidate all right."

"Is there any prospect that the Democratic State Committee will nominate the two Bartletts?" "There is a division of opinion among Democrats about that," said Mr. Murphy. "Some people think they ought to be nominated, and, on the other hand, a lot of people up the state think the other way."

Senator McCarren was at the City Hall a few minutes yesterday. When asked about the probable action of the Democratic State Committee he said: "I believe that the state committee will endorse both Bartletts. I can't believe that at this particular juncture the Democratic party will commit hara-kiri."

The Senator said he did not know when the state committee would meet. Senator McCarren's statement means that there will be a fight in the state committee over the question of endorsing the Bartletts. Conners and Murphy are believed to be opposed to it, largely because of the attitude of William R. Hearst, who, it is said, will not assent to the nomination of either of the Bartletts.
