AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

Washington, Sept. 25.—The President and Mrs. Roosevelt and their children, Miss Ethel and Quentin, reached the White House at 6 o'clock this evening.

The White House indeed deserves its name, for since the President left Washington in the early summer all of the old paint has been removed by burning, even to that on the capitals of the pillars supporting the porticos, and several coats of dead white have been applied.

The Postmaster General is comfortably located in his new home, leased early last spring. He will be joined there by Mrs. Meyer and her daughters and son as soon as the weather here becomes sufficiently settled.

THE CABINET.

Washington, Sept. 25.—The Secretary of State and Mrs. Root left this afternoon for Mexico, the only other member of the party being Percival Gassett, who will act as Mr. Root's secretary.

The Secretary of the Interior and Mrs. Garfield, who have spent the last few weeks at their home at Monticello, N. H., will arrive in Washington tomorrow.

The Ambassador from Japan and Viscountess Aoki have returned to Washington and opened the embassy for the fall and winter season.

The Ambassador from Germany and his wife, who have spent the summer in Europe with Mrs. Nabuco and their family, will remain in Germany with the ambassador, but will return in November.

THE NEWS THIS MORNING.

FOREIGN.—The steamer train from Paris, carrying passengers for the Adriatic at Cherbourg, was run into by the Rouen express.

DOMESTIC.—President Roosevelt and family arrived in Washington from their summer home at Sagamore Hill, New York, Sunday.

CITY.—Stocks were weak. Minority stockholders of the Metropolitan Street Railway planned a fight for dividends.

TAMMANY UNVEILED. Tuesday's turbulent primaries served a useful public purpose in demonstrating afresh the utterly undemocratic character of what passes in this city as the Democratic party.

On occasions of state in Tammany Hall we hear much eloquence about the criminal denial to the Filipinos of the inalienable right of self-government.

Morocco may be, and indeed is, practically divided into three parts, one of which is almost indefinitely subdivided. First, there is a triangular tract extending on the coast from Rabat to Tetuan and inland a little beyond Fez.
