

GERMANY'S FINANCES. VON RHEINHABEN'S VIEW. Stringency Due to Prosperity—No Fears for United States.

Berlin, Oct. 13.—Baron von Rheinhaben, Prussian Minister of Finance, to-day gave an interview regarding the campaign being made in certain Paris and London newspapers against the soundness of German credit, in which it has been asserted to appear that Berlin bankers have sought to influence the foreign policy of Germany in the present situation to uphold German public and private finance. The Baron said:

The scarcity of money in Germany is a consequence of our extraordinary prosperity. The creation of additional means of production and the immense extension of commercial operations have absorbed the entire capital and have fresh accumulations derived from current profits. Many holders of state securities have sold them to meet industrial requirements or to share with their money in the higher dividends of prosperity. The normal conditions have been the other European countries, although it would not have been unreasonable if they had done so, because in Germany the investment of various kinds of trustships is not compulsory to the extent that it is in France and England, where immense sums of money are invested in the operation of the law in the United States are required to invest in government bonds. We should do the same in Germany, and I have drafted a bill on the subject of savings banks.

Although German funds have not been sustained in this way to the extent they have in other countries, the fact that foreign countries wish to buy our stock and are strongly guaranteed government securities, and are accessible, but we have no occasion to take any steps whatever to induce them to do so.

British consols dropped from 112 in 1897 to an average of 80 in 1906, and to 83 now. The French rente, from an average of 103 in 1897, to now 91.30, while German threes, which in 1897 were at an average of 97, now are 85.25.

As an indication of the unusual prosperity of Germany, the Minister referred to the increase in the Prussian income tax returns, which grew from a total of \$1,140,800,000 in 1893 to \$2,096,000,000 in 1906, while the returns for 1907 are \$2,292,000,000, or more than double those of twenty-five years ago, and more than 10 per cent increase for one year. The same degree of prosperity prevails in nearly all of the other German States.

Baron von Rheinhaben had before him the figures of property owned by the Prussian State, which stands as security for the state debt and Prussian share of the imperial debt. The total Prussian obligations are \$1,560,000,000, and the Prussian proportion of three-fifths of the imperial debt of \$750,000,000 would be \$450,000,000, or a total Prussian responsibility of \$2,020,000,000. State owned properties are estimated to be worth \$5,000,000,000, which include \$1,500,000,000 in lands and forests, \$3,000,000,000 in railways and \$140,000,000 in mines and other state undertakings.

Concerning the financial soundness of the United States, Baron von Rheinhaben said:

I have absolute faith in the undiminished prosperity of the United States and in the certainty that at the present stringency in public money there in Germany is closely connected with the great demand of development. We rejoice over America's prosperity as good friends and because the prosperity of the United States contributes to our prosperity. Americans buy more from us when they have a great deal of money. With your constant expansion in the home market and almost limitless internal expansion the Americans are not likely to compete sharply in our own markets. I have not been able to perceive the least indication that the United States is in anything like serious difficulties.

Baron von Rheinhaben, who pleasantly remembers the hospitality which he enjoyed during his visit to the United States in 1905, has been since then a close observer of affairs in that country.

BELGIAN TRADE INCREASES.

Brussels, Oct. 13.—The reports of the different state departments for the first eight months of 1907 show a remarkable increase in the national commerce. Imports reached the sum of 2,597,719,000 francs, as against 1,548,616,000 francs for the same period last year. Exports are also on the increase with 1,722,619,000 francs, against 1,567,150,000 francs the shipping returns give an increase of 598,000 tons entering and 570,000 outgoing.

In addition, statistics prepared by the chambers of commerce show that all the large manufacturing houses are working at full pressure and have orders on hand which will keep them occupied through the coming year.

THE TRADE OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

St. John's, N. F., Oct. 12.—The total imports of Newfoundland for the fiscal year ended last June amounted to \$10,155,990, according to the annual report just completed. This was slightly in excess of the total imports of the preceding year, which reached the sum of \$10,414,274. The exports in the last fiscal year amounted to \$12,101,161, as against \$12,625,726, the total for the previous year. The total customs revenue was \$2,504,065.

Woman Trainer, Hurt by One of Her Animals, Predicts Her Death That Way. (By Telegraph to the Tribune.)

ONE KILLED IN RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

Roseton, Va., Oct. 12.—Norfolk & Western passenger train No. 2, bound from Norfolk to Columbus, Ohio, and an extra coal train, derailed, side-wheeled in a cut near Montvale, sixteen miles east of Roseton, at 4 o'clock this afternoon, resulting in the death of K. F. Umbrager, express messenger, of Whylsville, Va., and the injury of a dozen passengers, none of whom, however, was seriously hurt. The passenger train was loaded with people returning from the Jamestown exposition. Three passenger coaches were demolished and twenty-five coal cars were piled up.

JEWISH SABBATH ASSOCIATION.

The Jewish Sabbath Association held its first meeting of the season at the Educational Alliance, East Broadway and Jefferson street, last night. The Rev. Dr. Brachman, president of the association, was the first speaker, and he was followed by Rabbi Margolies, Rabbi Hupstein, Judge Otto A. Rosensky and the Rev. Dr. H. Perera Mendes. Most of the speeches were in Yiddish.

DISABLED STEAMER TOWED TO PORT.

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—The Oceanic Steamship Company's steamer Mariposa, which was drifting without port seventy miles off Monterey, was towed in port this afternoon by the tugs Dauntless and Bell. The Mariposa was towed to the pier by the tug Mariposa and twenty-seven passengers, including several women and children.

FIRE WRECKS NEWSPAPER PLANT.

Lexington, Va., Oct. 13.—The Hopkins Block, in the business section of this city, was destroyed by fire to-day. Five firms, including the plant of The Knoxville County News, were located in the block. The loss is \$60,000 and the insurance \$34,000.

UNIQUE WOMEN'S SOCIETY FORMED.

Sponsors of Naval Vessels Soon to Perfect Permanent Organization. Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 13.—Sponsors of naval vessels are organizing a society of naval sponsors. There are 162 names on the list of eligibles. Of these only fifty have been reached, because no record has been kept of the women who have named the great vessels or the smaller gunboats. A meeting will be called for some time this winter in Washington to perfect permanent organization. In the mean time a committee, headed by Miss Annie Keith Frazier, of Chattanooga, daughter of Senator James B. Frazier, and sponsor of the Tennessee, is at work on the organization.

YAQUIS KILL WEALTHY MEXICANS.

Indians Murder Two Men Near Mining Camp—Troops Sent in Pursuit. San Antonio, Tex., Oct. 13.—A dispatch to "The Express" from Guaymas, Mexico, says that Jesus Brocamoto and Ricardo Robles, members of two of the wealthiest families in this section, were ambushed late yesterday by a band of twelve Yaqui Indians. Brocamoto being killed outright and his companion fatally wounded. The attack occurred in the vicinity of the Colorado mining camp. The Indians escaped after robbing their victims. The killing has aroused the indignation of the better element of this district, and a large detachment of soldiers has been sent on the trail of the Indians.

ALL WANT THE PALMER REWARD.

Sheriff Besieged by Persons Who Say They Searched for Missing Woman. (By Telegraph to the Tribune.)

Greenwich, Conn., Oct. 13.—Sheriff Ritch said to-day he was almost sorry that he began to give to his neighbors any part of the \$1,000 reward which Stephen Palmer, of New York, gave him when he found Miss Louise Palmer, his sister, after twenty-four hours' search, hiding in a haystack. The Sheriff is besieged night and day, in person, by telephone and letter, by persons asking for part of the reward. He said he has seen a man who "I paid out in twenty-five minutes all that I had in mind, but even now people ring my doorbell at night, search me out in public places, ring the telephone, and to-night I received a two-sheet letter on the printed stationery of Hugh R. Garden, a lawyer in the Mutual Life Building, New York, signed 'Mr. West,' in which he says it seems strange that he and his two sons and wife did not get any of the money being distributed, and wherein he claims to have done everything but find the woman. He says, 'Will you communicate these facts to Mr. Palmer yourself, or shall I do so?' Mr. West, as far as I have learned, saw Miss Palmer pass through his yard.

"Another man who demanded money, I find out, reached home from a fair at 9 o'clock, was asleep at 10, and was awakened then by someone who asked for matches to search his home. He gave the matches and went back to bed. I paid another man for the loss of an overcoat, and I saw him wearing it to-night. Two others couldn't even tell me where the woods were. The gardener on the Myler place thinks he ought to get pay for tearing his barn down, as he calls it, when all he did was to toss back a little hay in the barn."

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS MEET.

Mayor Fitzgerald Predicts Population of 125,000,000 in Twenty Years. The Knights of Columbus commemorated "Discovery Day" at Carnegie Hall last night. It is the custom every year for the different councils to assemble and honor the discoverer of America, and last night's programme was an unusually brilliant one. Prominent knights from all over the state and New England were there. The entertainment was arranged by the New York City councils.

Among the visitors who came at the invitation of the New York council was Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston. Henry T. Herbert, the state deputy of the organization, was the presiding officer of the meeting. The Rev. Michael T. Smith, of the Paulist Fathers, gave a sketch of the life of Columbus. Mayor Fitzgerald had a stock of statistics to illustrate the resources of this country in comparison with other nations. He said that, judging from his wonderful growth, he was justified in predicting a population of 125,000,000 in twenty years.
