

ON COLLEGE GRIDIRONS. MANY GAMES SCHEDULED. Princeton and Pennsylvania Will Meet Worthy Foes.

CLOSE FINISHES RULE. JUGGLER WINS AGAIN.

Rosimiro Beats Bouquet a Head in Two-Year-Old Handicap.

Close and stirring finishes marked four of the six races at Jamaica yesterday, and the sport, in striking contrast to that of Thursday, was interesting from end to end.

Juggler repeated his good race of Tuesday and won the Garden City Stakes after a long head-and-head drive with Grapple. The attendance at the race was the largest since the opening of the season.

Rosimiro ran a particularly good race in the handicap for two-year-olds, and showed that with proper handling he could come from behind and win.

Twelve horses went to the post in the selling race at a mile and a quarter, but only three were prominent in the race, as the others were so badly outrun at the end of six furlongs that they played no part in the struggle through the stretch.

Oraculum was a hot favorite at even money in the handicap for three-year-olds, but the weight and distance were both against him, and he finished far behind Zingapo and Summer Cloud.

Those who backed Belle Griffon from 40 to 1 to 15 in the first race got a sensation, but nothing else. She made the running up the backstretch and around the turn, but just when she began to beat to count the money won she ran out and Tartar Maid taking command.

Lord Lovan ran away four miles in his preliminary gallop for the second race and was withdrawn with the consent of the stewards.

Phyllis A. and Brussel did a ground and lofty tumbling act in the last race which brought a cry of horror from the crowd in the stand and then a cheer. Phyllis A. bolted into the rail directly in front of the stand on the way to the post and fell in a heap, sending Brussel flying over her head.
