HOLD UP THE IMMIGRANTS.

Steamship Companies Stop Inward Rush Until Financial Conditions Improve.

(By Telegraph to The Tribune.)
 Galveston, Dec. 7.—The North German Lloyd and the Hamburg-American steamship companies have sent orders to their European agents not to sell tickets to and more immigration immigrants for the Southwestern gateway until industrial and financial conditions in this country are greatly improved. This is the result of unloading several hundred aliens, who, not being able to find work, have become public charges. There are five hundred of these scattered over the states who will have to be returned to Europe at the expense of the steamship companies. Nearly six hundred more arrived to-day on the North German Lloyd steamer Hannover and will have to be taken back.

DELAY ON CANCELLING JOINT RATES.

Interstate Commerce Commission Sends Request to New Haven Road.

Washington, Dec. 7.—The Interstate Commerce Commission refused to-day to grant the application of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey for a petition by the commission to a circuit court of the United States to take proceedings to prevent or injunction the cancellation of joint tariffs and rates between the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company and the Central of New Jersey and other carriers. The application was denied without prejudice.

The commission has requested the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad to postpone for not less than thirty days the taking effect of its notice of such cancellation, already filed with the commission to take effect on December 17. Permission has been forwarded to the chief traffic official of that company to effect such postponement on less than statutory notice.

The commission in announcing this action explained that it made this request upon the grounds of general public interest and in order to give the various communities, shippers and carriers affected by the proposed action opportunity to determine the course they will pursue with respect to the future movement of the traffic involved.

COUGH DROPE CAUSED COLD FEET.

But the Chill Did Not Arrive in Time to Save the Crowd's Dimes.

A quiet spoken man stood at 10th street and Broadway last night with an open satchel hanging from his neck. In the satchel were boxes labelled "Medicated Cough Drope, Made by H. Henschel, New York." They were guaranteed under the pure food and drugs act, according to the box. A crowd gathered around the man.

"You pay 10 cents and draw a prize," he said. "There's 10 cents in almost every box and 50 in some. Get 'em quick and keep quiet."

The first man to pay 10 cents shook his box of cough drope. It jingled. He opened it and shining dollars and half dollars fell out. The man with the satchel could not take in the dimes that beset him. His hands were too few. When interest lagged and the boxes revealed nothing but cough drope there was always some one who drew a box containing \$5. Nobody counted, but everybody had a cold.

The satchel and its carrier journeyed from 10th street to 15th street before anybody discovered that it was the same old game. This somebody told a policeman, who could not run fast enough to catch the satchel carrier, although he was handicapped by dimes.

CALIFORNIA TRUST IN BAD SHAPE.

Governor Gillette Finds Company Totally Insolvent—To Begin Proceedings.

San Francisco, Dec. 7.—Recommendation was made to-day by the bank commissioners to Attorney General Webb to take legal action relative to appointing a receiver for the California Safe Deposit and Trust Company, of San Francisco, which suspended business several weeks ago.

The same recommendation was made by the bank commissioners in the case of William Collins & Sons, Bank of Ventura.

Sacramento, Cal., Dec. 7.—Governor Gillette made the following statement to-day:

At a meeting yesterday of the depositors of the California Safe Deposit and Trust Company I found the bank totally insolvent. Orders have been given to the Attorney General to place it in the hands of a receiver.

The depositors found that \$3,549 had been loaned to directors on their personal note, without security, and to companies with which the directors were connected. A clerk named Bradford was loaned \$10,000 on his personal note, without security.

The committee of depositors worked all day and found that out of \$300,000 assets only \$2,000,000 could be realized. They discovered that on the day the bank closed, instead of the 20 per cent of the deposits which the law requires they had only 4 per cent. The building trades is the heaviest loser, as this organization had \$100,000 on deposit.
