

TROOPS AT GOLDFIELD.

SOLDIERS BRING RELIEF.

Miners Place Blame for Strike Upon the Owners.

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 7.—The first section of the train bearing United States troops from San Francisco to Goldfield arrived here at 12:30 o'clock this afternoon. Colonel Alfred Reynolds, 2nd Infantry, who is in command, accompanied the first section. He was met at the station by a committee of citizens.

Goldfield breathed a sigh of relief this morning when the day broke without any act of violence having been committed during the night. It was feared that in anticipation of the coming of the troops the lawless might make a demonstration.

NO HOPE FOR MINERS.

ONLY BODIES ARE FOUND.

Dead at Monongah Estimated To Be at Least 400.

Monongah, W. Va., Dec. 7.—Twenty-two bodies have been brought to the surface from mines Nos. 6 and 8 of the Fairmont Coal Company, where an explosion occurred yesterday. The work of searching the mines continues, but despite all efforts progress is slow. The further into the mines the rescuers go the greater is the volume of black damp they encounter, and this deadly gas is seriously interfering with their work.

Many of the rescuers, overcome by the fumes, have to be carried from the mines. A number are in a serious condition and several probably will die. Only a small part of the two mines

POLICE ORDER DRASTIC.

Bingham Says Treat Everybody Alike and Close Everything.

If the police decided to close these places they would have to wait until tomorrow, when the proprietors could be taken before a magistrate to try their cases all over again.



hall, however, the scene was different, for there the troops were depressed and surly. The hall was packed all night and this morning the street in front of the hall was full of anxious and weary looking men.

The operators and business men of Goldfield are pleased with the promise of the establishment of a permanent garrison at this point, such assurance having been received from Washington, where the advisability of a garrison for Nevada has been discussed from time to time. There are no federal troops nearer than San Francisco.

The fact that labor troubles are constantly breaking out and that there is no state militia makes the necessity of a garrison in Nevada all the more pressing. The mines are in a condition to increase their output tremendously.

Denver, Dec. 7.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Western Federation of Miners in this city it was agreed to levy an assessment upon members of the union for the benefit of the Goldfield strikers. The possibility of obtaining an investigation by Congress of President Roosevelt's action in sending troops to Goldfield at the request of Governor Sparks of Nevada was discussed, and it was practically decided to bring the matter to the attention of Congress.

The action of the President in sending troops to Goldfield was the result of a prearranged conspiracy between Wall Street interests and Governor Sparks, declared Acting President Mahoney after the executive session. "There was absolutely no need for such action. It seems peculiar, to say the least, that troops should be hurried to Goldfield before the Sheriff had made any request upon the government for aid and without his knowledge. This action is unprecedented, and some ulterior motive is undoubtedly responsible for the outrage. The federation will render every assistance in its power to the striking miners."

William D. Haywood, secretary, declared that the mine owners were themselves responsible for the strike, and any trouble that followed must be laid to their doors. He said that the owners had violated their agreement and ignored a compromise to which they had agreed. Haywood declared absurd the story sent out from Los Angeles that he had instigated the strike.

"When I left Nevada," said Haywood, "the Goldfield miners and operators had reached an agreement. The miners agreed as a compromise to accept their wages half in cash and half in cash certificates, and the owners accepted this compromise. It was when the operators refused to stick to the terms of the bargain and declined either to guarantee their checks or pay any part in cash that the miners were forced to strike. The certificates were accepted at only one store, and the miners, consequently, were without means to live."

"I had a conference with United States Senator Nixon of the Consolidated Companies, in which he personally agreed to the terms of the compromise. The mine owners have only themselves to blame for this trouble."

ASK RECEIVER FOR COAL COMPANY. Steubenville, Dec. 7.—A receiver was applied for to-day in court for the M. L. Williams Coal and Coke Company, of Portland, Ohio, whose main office is at Pittsburg. The plant is being operated at a loss and is alleged to be insolvent, with outstanding claims aggregating \$29,000.

The number of dead will not fall below four hundred and probably will reach close to five hundred. About 40 per cent of the entombed men are Americans. All hope is gone that any of the men are still alive. Nearly four hundred coffins reached Monongah to-day from Pittsburg and from West Virginia cities.

A slight fire inside of the slope of No. 8 mine this morning followed the starting of the fan. It was extinguished after an hour, and the working of the fan successfully greatly aided the efforts of the rescuers to get into the mines.

C. W. Watson, president of the Consolidated Coal Company, has given out the following statement.

The accident is deplorable from any standpoint. It was entirely unexpected, and as yet we do not know the exact cause. It might have resulted from a blown out shot igniting a pocket of gas. About 50 per cent of the mine accidents of the country are caused in this manner. It is probable the present one resulted from the same cause. We will conduct a rigid investigation. Investigations, however, will not benefit the dead miners. Their families will be looked after. The company will bury all the dead. Every facility within the power of the company is being extended to all newspaper men in order that the general public may be accurately informed as to the disaster. We have nothing to conceal and are pleased to give whatever information we can.

All saloons in Monongah have been closed since the explosion, and the six thousand miners employed in other mines in the neighborhood have suspended work and tendered their assistance to the rescuing parties.

Mining experts pronounce the rescue work in this disaster the most thorough ever provided under similar circumstances, and friends and relatives receive every courtesy and consideration.

Coroner E. C. Amos, of Fairmont, will probably begin the inquest into the explosion on Monday morning.

BULLETS NOT FROM ARMY RIFLES.

Result of Expert Analysis of Those Used in Brownsville Riot.

Washington, Dec. 7.—The expert analysis of the bullets submitted as evidence in the Brownsville investigation has been completed. It is understood it shows that the bullets were not of the variety in use by the army at the time of the Brownsville riot. General Crozier, chief of ordnance, concurs in the belief that the bullets submitted were not fired from army rifles. The analysis, with correspondence from General Crozier, will be submitted to the Senate Committee on Military Affairs at its meeting next Tuesday.

RIPARIAN RIGHTS WARNING.

Secretary McGee of Inland Waterways Commission Sees Revolution Ahead.

Chicago, Dec. 7.—The startling assertion that the rapid acquisition of America's riparian rights by the railroads and other private interests is involving the country in a situation which threatens a revolution is made by W. J. McGee, secretary of the United States Inland Waterways Commission. The speaker affirmed that this activity of private interests is throttling navigation and depriving the country of its greatest single source of wealth.

"The country is on the verge of a revolution of a grave character," Mr. McGee declared. "The absolute monopoly of our land and our waterways by a certain few private individuals will surely result in a general American people do not take steps to protect their riparian rights. The railroads are our menace. From St. Paul to New Orleans there is not a single town excepting Vicksburg where the people do not own and control the river frontage and bridges. It is a wonder that navigation declines when corporations are grabbing these sites."

That no mistakes should be made in the enforcement of the Blue Sunday order, Commissioner Bingham called all inspectors to Police Headquarters yesterday morning and explained in detail the meaning of General Order 8, in which the law was defined. Before going over the order in detail the Commissioner explained that in many instances the inspectors would be expected to exercise their own judgment, particularly in those districts where the injunctions had been granted, and he warned them not to use any undue force in closing places, but to explain that they were there to do their duty, and that the law had been clearly and definitely interpreted by Justice O'Gorman. "Every place is covered in the law," said the Commissioner. "That order and decision mean simply the stopping of any public entertainment or amusement on Sunday. That is the keynote, and it will not be often that you will be called upon to use your own discretion in the matter of fulfilling your duty." Then the Commissioner pointed out that the decision covered Carnegie Hall, the Hippodrome, the 1-cent and 5-cent vaudeville shows and the moving picture shows alike. He stated that roller skating rinks, dance halls, entertainments usually given by the Young Men's Christian Association, the children's shows in the Educational Alliance Building and the entertainment at Celtic Park are all included in the closing order. "It prohibits public sports and exercises or shows," said the Commissioner when he was interrupted by one of the inspectors. "We have no discretion whatever under the law as it is laid down. It cuts out all games of football or any other kind of ball, and naturally cuts out the bicycle race which is to be held at Madison Square Garden until 12:01 Monday morning when the doors of the Garden can be opened, as the managers of the race have promised not to start their teams until 1 o'clock Monday morning."

Another inspector suggested that dancing might not come under the ban, but he was quickly corrected by the Commissioner, who replied that "all performances and entertainments in places of public amusement" clearly included dancing. He repeated that the present order was far-reaching and that every one must be treated alike. A policeman would be stationed in front of every theatre, he said, with orders to reply to all questions. "They will be to show me if any one insisted, to reply: 'These are our orders.'"

As final advice the Commissioner instructed his men that music in hotels and restaurants would be tolerated provided that no attempt was made to add to the entertainment by having a vaudeville show or chorus. The orders were later distributed to all the precinct captains.

While elaborate arrangements have been made by the police to give New Yorkers a picturesque Sunday, the showmen are being held in no less cautious to keep everything closed. All along Broadway the managers said they would shut up the city so closely that not an ounce of amusement would leak out. They thought that one real tight Sunday would soon bring the public to the realization that the law should be repealed as soon as possible. The theatrical men also discussed the plan to amend the law before the Board of Aldermen and ask for an ordinance which would be likely to result in a liberal Sunday and make it possible to give shows without getting injunctions and fighting in the courts for months for a definite settlement.

In the Bowery and in upper Third avenue the moving picture showmen were blue indeed. Several hundred of these shows are scattered around the East Side and in the thickly populated sections of upper Manhattan. They will suffer more than any other show places, as they depend on the Sunday crowd for most of their income, and if the law is not modified most of the resorts will be forced to close. The Bowery moving picture men gathered in the office of Edward Valenti, who controls the slot machine "parlors" and shooting gallery in the Bowery, and they adopted resolutions asking that this form of amusement was not under the law, as they were of amusement, but merely exhibitions, such as are now shown in any museum. It was finally decided, however, not to make any test cases.

No special orders have been given to the all night saloons or the "back room" proprietors, where family entertainments are given on Sunday evenings for patrons only. Although the proprietors of several of these places thought they would take no chances, they said they would take no chances, and any suspicious looking person would be kept out.
