HARRIMAN NET EARNINGS DECLINE.

Results of Union and Southern Pacific for October Make Poor Comparisons.

Net earnings of the Harriman roads for the month of October, figures of which were received yesterday, show noteworthy decreases from the corresponding time a year ago, Union Pacific presenting a loss of \$355,037, against a gain in gross of \$1,23,339, and Southern Pacific a loss in net of \$1,420,403, against an increase in gross of \$1,213,235. 
