SKATER SAVES TWO DROWNING BOYS.

Draws Them to Shore, One Clinging Senseless to the Other's Legs.

[By Telegraph to The Tribune.]
Stamford, Conn., Jan. 11.—John Eganis, formerly a long distance skater and pedestrian, saved Robert Carlin and Howard Lewis, a negro boy, from drowning in the Rippowan River here this afternoon. Lewis broke through the ice and Carlin, who tried to save him, also fell into the water. Mr. Eganis, now nearly sixty years old, was skating on the river. Trying to save them he broke through also, but saved himself by jumping from a detached cake to solid ice. Then he got a long pole and drew Carlin through the broken ice to the shore. Lewis was found clinging to Carlin's legs. He had been under water more than a minute and was unconscious, but prompt treatment saved him. This makes thirteen persons saved from drowning by Mr. Eganis.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS.

Chicago, Jan. 11.—Expectation of increased world's shipments was chiefly responsible for a bearish wheat market to-day. The May option at the close was off 3/8¢; provisions closed 1/2¢ lower; oats were down 5/8¢. Receipts showed losses of 7 1/2¢ to 7 3/4¢.
Spending dull, the wheat market showed a tendency to ease in the absence of speculative interest. A selling movement that resulted in lower prices was due to an estimate by a Chicago grain journal that the world's shipments for the week would show large increase. A decline at Liverpool of 1 1/2¢ to 2¢ was reflected in the opening price here.

May being off at the start 3/8¢ to 1/2¢ at \$1.65 to \$1.66. A momentary show of improvement, based on a report of probable shortage of the Russian crop, carried prices slightly higher, but the advance was soon lost. May sold up to \$1.66 1/2, but on resumption of liquidation broke to \$1.65 1/2 to \$1.65 1/4, closing at \$1.65 1/4, a net loss of 1/8¢. Primary receipts were 321,000 bushels, compared with 556,000 bushels for the corresponding day a year ago. Closing in a measure as a check to the bearishness. May opened 3/8¢ to 1/2¢ lower at 99 1/2¢, sold at 99 1/2¢, but closed weak 1/2¢ above the bottom at 99 1/2¢. Local receipts were 42 cars, with none of contract grade.
Trade in oats was extremely dull, but was confined almost entirely to operations by pit traders. There was more or less selling pressure, in sympathy with the sentiment in other grain, and the 1907 was heavy. May opened a shade higher at 14 1/2¢, and sold between that figure and 25¢ to 25 1/2¢, where it closed. Local receipts were 125 cars.
Provisions were fairly steady, a smaller run of hogs that expected offsetting free offerings by packing interests. The close showed a net loss for May pork of 7 1/2¢ at \$13.27 1/2. Lard was down 2 1/2¢ at \$8.65 and ribs closed 2 1/2¢ lower at \$7.25 1/2. Estimated receipts for Monday: Wheat, 29 cars; corn, 573 cars; oats, 221 cars; hogs, 38,000 head.

MAIL CARRIER KILLED BY TRAIN.

Batavia, N. Y., Jan. 11.—Roderick O. Burt, a rural mail carrier, was killed by a passenger train on the New York Central road this morning. His wagon was demolished and the horse was killed.

W. L. BULL, ILL, TO TAKE REST.

William Lanman Bull, senior member of the firm of Edward Sweet & Co., bankers, of No. 17 Nassau street, and director in more than twenty corporations, has retired from active business for six months or a year because of ill health. Notice has been posted for the transfer of Mr. Bull's seat on the New York Stock Exchange to William G. D. Morgan. Mr. Bull has been a member of the firm of Edward Sweet & Co. since 1869, and was president of the Stock Exchange from 1888 to 1899. Some of the institutions and companies in which he is a director are the American Exchange National Bank, the City Investing Company, the Metropolitan Trust Company and the Western Union Telegraph Company. He also is a member of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Bull will continue as a partner in the firm of Edward Sweet & Co. Ralph M. Stuart-Wortley, of the same firm, transferred his seat recently to Chalmer Wood, jr., leaving the firm to become treasurer of the United Metals Selling Company.
