

DEATH PENALTY ASKED THE TRIAL OF STOESEL.

Judge Advocate Sums Up Case Against the Generals.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—The final session of the Stoesel court martial began to-day. Lieutenant General Stoesel, General Fock and General Reiss are being tried for the surrender of Port Arthur to the Japanese.

Summing up to-day, the judge advocate demanded that the court impose the death sentence on Stoesel, Fock and Reiss—on Stoesel as the responsible agent for the shameful surrender of the fortress and the cowardly ending of its glorious defence, and on Fock and Reiss as the men who inspired and abetted him.

General Gursky paid the highest tribute to the brave defenders of the fortress, several hundred of whom were seated in the crowded courtroom.

GREAT MOORISH LOSSES.

Report That 10,000 Men Were Killed or Wounded Near Serrat.

London, Feb. 4.—A London news agency publishes a dispatch from Tangier saying that there has been a battle between the French and the Moors near Serrat, Morocco, in which ten thousand Moors were killed or wounded and in which the French losses amounted to one hundred and sixty men, including four officers.

JAPAN'S TAXES HEAVIER.

Diet Votes Increase on Sugar, Alcohol and Kerosene.

Tokyo, Feb. 4.—After a heated debate lasting five hours an increase in the taxation bills on sugar, saké, alcohol, beer and kerosene was passed to-day in the Diet.

DE CASTELLANES IN COURT.

Count Boni's Reasons for Assault on Prince Helie de Sagan.

Paris, Feb. 4.—The case of Count Boni and Count Jean de Castellane, his brother, charged with assault by Prince Helie de Sagan, again came up in the Correctional Court to-day.

AGAINST PICTURE SLOT MACHINES.

Resolution Before Aldermen Asking Commissioner Bingham to Suppress Them.

Alderman Velson, at the meeting of the board yesterday, introduced a resolution calling on the Police Commissioner to use the powers of his office to the utmost to do away with the picture slot machines.

A BOYCOTT OF ASIATICS.

Johannesburg, Feb. 4.—A movement was started to-day at a largely attended meeting to boycott Asiatic traders and all employers of Asiatics.

MOVING TOWARD PERSIA. Russia Orders 5,000 Men to the Disputed Frontier.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—Five thousand troops have been ordered from the Northern Caucasus to the Turko-Persian frontier, whither smaller detachments of soldiers have been moving steadily for several weeks.

This concentration is due to the aggressive attitude of the Turks in their frontier dispute with the Persians.

It is believed in St. Petersburg that Russia is about to undertake a military demonstration against Turkey.

Recent advices received from the Caucasus indicate that the Russian inhabitants are considerably alarmed over the concentration of Turkish troops in Armenia and the region seized from Persia, which, it is believed, is designed as a reply to any attempt at demonstration on the part of Russia.

Under the cover of Kurdish tribesmen, the Turks are reported to be massing infantry at Bayazid and other strategic points near the frontier in such strength as to dispose of the probability that the movement is intended solely against non-militant Persia.

NEWHALL'S CREW SAVED.

Daring Rescues by Men from the Steamer Bermudian.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Feb. 4.—The steamer Bermudian arrived here from New York this morning. She brings details of the abandonment at sea of the four-masted schooner Mary A. Newhall, of Bath, Me., Captain Andrew Adams, of Portland.

General Fock was charged with the premature evacuation of important fortifications in order to impress the garrison with the necessity for a speedy surrender. The advocate general concluded as follows:

Continued from first page. not be placed in the coffin first prepared for it, and another has been prepared. Those who saw the body of the Crown Prince to-day observed that the face was disfigured by a wound in the cheek which the skill of the embalmers had not been able to conceal.

The bodies of the King and Crown Prince will lie in state from early to-morrow morning until late on Friday night. Court chamberlains of the late King and members of the royal military household will keep watch. Their vigil will be continued day and night until the bodies are removed to the royal Pantheon of St. Vincent for burial.

An interesting conversation with the new King is reported by the Countess of San Luis, the wife of the Spanish Minister here. The Minister is a great favorite at the Portuguese court, and went with the countess to meet the royal family on the day of the tragedy.

Prince Manuel, looking pale from the loss of blood and violent emotions, came toward me with his left hand outstretched, his right being bandaged and in a sling. He said: "I am very unhappy, and everything that has occurred these last few hours seems only a terrible nightmare."

What I saw and heard that sanguinary day," he said, "will never be effaced from my memory. The spectacle of the King and the Crown Prince and of the Queen and the little prince clasping their dead cannot truly be described."

Salamanca, Spain, Feb. 4.—Dr. José M. Alpoim, chief of the Progressive Dissidents, who fled from Lisbon, has taken refuge here. In a statement to-day he says:

The assassinations at Lisbon were the result of a popular explosion, the inevitable outcome of unbearable conditions. The real assassin was Franco, who induced the King to create a division among the monarchial parties.

PRECAUTIONS IN SPAIN.

Fear of Outbreak at Barcelona—King and Queen at Seville.

Madrid, Feb. 4.—King Alfonso and Queen Victoria are at Seville. They will not return to Madrid unless the situation in Portugal becomes worse and it seems desirable that they should be near the ministry and parliament to ratify steps necessary to protect Spanish interests.

Seville, Feb. 4.—King Alfonso, while sauntering through the streets of Seville on the day before the tragedy at Lisbon, was attacked by a policeman, whose object was to keep back the crowd from the King. He mistook the King himself for a suspicious looking person.

NO INTERVENTION OF POWERS.

France Denies Reports—Senate Passes Resolution of Condolence.

Paris, Feb. 4.—An official note was published here to-day denying allegations that the fall of Premier Franco from power was due to the intervention of either France or Great Britain.

SYMPATHY VOTED AT WASHINGTON.

House Passes Resolution Expressing Sorrow Over Portuguese Crises.

Washington, Feb. 4.—A resolution of sorrow on the assassination of the King and Crown Prince of Portugal was adopted by the House of Representatives to-day. It reads as follows:

DOM MIGUEL RETURNS TO AUSTRIA.

Vienna, Feb. 4.—Dom Miguel de Braganza, the pretender to the throne of Portugal, has curried his way back to Austria. This step, it is understood, is taken on the advice of relatives, to avoid any action which could be in anyway misconstrued.

KAISER'S DELEGATE TO FUNERAL.

Berlin, Feb. 4.—Emperor William has appointed Prince Frederick Leopold of Prussia to represent him at the funeral in Lisbon next Saturday of the King and Crown Prince of Portugal. Prince Frederick left here to-day with his suite.

PLANS FOR NAVAL PRIZE COURT. British Premier Points Out Necessary Changes in the Laws. London, Feb. 4.—Premier Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman announced in the House of Commons to-day that material changes would have to be enacted by Parliament in various British and Colonial laws before the convention adopted at The Hague last summer establishing an international naval prize court could be ratified.

MILYUKOV'S ABUSER PUNISHED. St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—The Conservatives opened an attack on Paul Milyukov in the Duma to-day because of his American trip, but their plan was frustrated by the violence of the spokesman, M. Puriashkevitch, whose attack was in such abusive phraseology as to entail his exclusion for fifteen sessions, the maximum penalty which the Duma can impose.
