

of the visit of the evangelist and his corps of workers. Before becoming an evangelist Dr. Chapman was a successful pastor in New York and New Jersey.

Dr. Chapman was born in Richmond, Ind., in 1859. He was left an orphan at nineteen and had to struggle to complete his education. He was graduated from Lake Forest University in 1879 and from Lane Theological Seminary three years later.

While engaged in missions in England Mr. Alexander married Miss Helen Cadbury, a daughter of the well known philanthropist, Richard Cadbury, of Birmingham. Two years later he left Dr. Torrey and made a second tour of the world for the restoration of Mrs. Alexander's health.

During the last two years Mr. Alexander has been engaged in a search for new and popular Gospel hymns. He has secured a large number, and will shortly issue a new hymn book. Some of the most popular of the new Gospel songs, which will shortly be given to the public, are "He Will Hold Me Fast," "Who Could It Be But Jesus," "No Burdens Yonder," "Gladness," "The Song of the Sinner," "The Song of the Saint," "The Song of the Christian," "The Song of the Church," "The Song of the World."

Two prominent Episcopalian leaders who are working heartily for the success of the movement are Bishop Mackay-Smith and Dr. Floyd Tompkins. It is estimated that 200,000 church members are directly interested in the movement, while an army of several thousands has been enlisted as "active workers" in the campaign. These include 1000 personal workers, 5000 singers in district churches, 2000 workers, 1000 doorbell ringers to invite non-churchgoers to meetings, and 250 district leaders. The head of the entire committee having charge of the movement is John H. Converse, President of the Baldwin Locomotive Works.

On Thursday afternoon a preliminary meeting was held in Witherspoon Hall, when Messrs. Chapman and Alexander addressed their associates and gave final instructions for the opening of the movement in the evening. Dr. Chapman declared that he had worked and prayed for that hour for two years.

the first time in the history of Christendom a federated effort representing over fifteen millions of Protestant communions. A plan that is unique in this country at least, has been adopted by the program committee of the coming council meeting. It has been decided to ask the foremost religious leaders of the country for papers on a large number of topics in which there is federative interest, but these men are not to address the council unless they take part as delegates in the discussions on their papers. All delegates are to be printed in advance of the meeting, so that they may be placed in the hands of the delegates in their printed form. Each paper will be referred to some appropriate committee of the council, and the plan provides that the committee shall prepare resolutions suggested by the papers. Chairman of committees are to be permitted to speak for a limited time in presenting such resolutions, but it is intended that fully three-quarters of the time will be occupied by discussion from the floor, so that the first meeting of the Federal Council, a meeting which leaders believe will be an historic occasion, will be, it is hoped, a meeting for work rather than for oratory.

Gospel Tent Workers Here Regret His Leaving New York.

It is with deep regret that the many friends of the Rev. Dr. James B. Ely receive the news that he is not to have charge of the gospel tent work in this city during the coming season.

Called here in 1906 from a similar work in Philadelphia, where for several years he had successfully demonstrated his belief that the theories and methods previously followed by him as a missionary in India might reasonably and effectively be applied in evangelizing the foreign population in the great cities of America. Dr. Ely has for three seasons planned and superintended the summer campaigns of the evangelistic committee of New York City, with each year an increased number of tents and a larger number attending meetings.

As superintendent he has achieved a success in arousing interest, raising funds and directing campaigns which we believe few men could have attained. His interest in the work is undiminished. He finds it impossible, however, to carry on such vast plans both here and in Philadelphia and will return to resume his more active labors in that city.
